Propose Fairy Lake Beach Parks Board Hears Plan

A delegation from the Y's Men's Club was present at the Parks Board meeting Tuesday night in the Conestoga Chambers to present a plan outlining suggested changes in the swimming facilities at Fairy Lake.

The meeting adjourned with a suggestion that the Y's Men's club representatives and the Parks Board meet together Wednesday night at the park to discuss location of the facilities.

A meeting was held at the park last night (Wednesday) by the Parks Board and a delegation from the Y's Men's club to review possibilities of improving the swimming facilities.

A boom will be anchored across the lake from the park side to the Cameron Ave. side with one opening to allow boats to pass slowly through. It was the unanimous opinion that the bank of the swimming area would have to be altered greatly with the bank in front being reinforced to prevent erosion.

Alan Deacon, planning consultant, was present at the meeting to discuss toilet facilities and was instructed to submit plans for water supply drainage and construction of the bank.

The Acton Fire Department offered to provide garbage disposal containers for the park.

It was decided that the gates would continue to be locked in the tank at 10 p.m. every night.

The parks board authorized purchase of a new mower for cutting the grass at the park. A demonstration is to be held at the park on Wednesday, May 8.

The Y's Men's club wanted an area provided for swimming lessons for the YMCA, but the plan submitted would not leave sufficient space for other swimmers.

The parks board suggested further study be given on the proposed plans.
