Announce New Appointment For Lorne Scots Lt. Col. Barber

One of Georgetown's best known soldiers and citizens, Lt.-Col. John H. Barber, E.D., has been appointed Honorary Lieutenant - Colonel of the Lorne Scots (P.D. and H.R.). The announcement was made last Friday night at the annual Officers' Ball by Brigadier M.S. Dunn, O.B.E., E.D., C.D., Commander of Central Ontario Area.

Col Barber attended the University of Toronto from 1925-27 and was a member of the C.O.C. while at the university, qualifying for the rank of Lieutenant. Gaining his B.A. degree, he returned to the University of Toronto the following year to continue his M.A. degree in Philosophy. In 1925, he had joined the Halton Rifles and by 1927 was promoted to the rank of Captain. In 1931 he was company commander and in 1935 he was gazetted major and qualified for command by attending the Militia Staff Course in 1938.

When the Lorne Scots were mobilized in 1940, he was appointed company commander and went overseas with the unit. In England he was made 2IC of No. 1 Canadian General Reinforcement Unit and held that appointment until 1944 when he was made 2IC of No. 1 Regiment in Philosophy. In 1925, he had joined the Halton Rifles and by 1927 was promoted to the rank of Captain. In 1931 he was company commander and in 1935 he was gazetted major and qualified for command by attending the Militia Staff Course in 1938.

An insurance agent and travel broker in Georgetown, Col. Barber is a member of the Arts and Letters Club of Toronto, the Empire Club, the Royal Canadian Military Institute and a director of Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co.

Mechanical Brain Has Various Uses

VANCOUVER (CP)—An electronic computer which can do a year's "desk work" in eight hours is now operating at the University of Alberta.

The high-speed digital computer called ALWAC III E (short for Automatic Logical Weeney Green Automatic Computer) was installed at a cost of \$88,000. Its services are rented for \$40 an hour.

Cost of the device is being met in part by British Columbia industries and firms, and the federal government is being asked for additional funds. To some extent, the huge charge will make it self-supporting.

More than 60 firms enrolled for a course to study the machine's operation. About 175 faculty members and students also are taking the course costing \$100. The course teaches a company's engineer or executive how to translate his particular problem into a machine's language.
