Post Office Changes

Location After Century

NORVAL - The village marked an historic day on April 16 when the post office, which had been in one location since about 1840, moved to a new site.

The change was necessitated by alterations being made to the former Barnhill General Store by Wilfred Kirkwood who purchased it last fall and is moving his entire merchandising operation to the new location.

The post office is temporarily located in Penley's Store.

Members of the Barnhill Family
have been postmasters since 1860. The position was first held by Wm. J. Barnhill, later, by his brother, E. J. Barnhill, and latterly by Hardy Barnhill, son of E. J., who was the last proprietor.

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
