Due to the fire in the old school, it was very necessary to use all available space. Therefore, our two kindergarten primary classes were moved to the general purpose room or auditorium. The kindergarten area was partitioned to accommodate two grade classes. Until such time as the M. Z. Bennett school is ready for occupancy, the auditorium will continue to be used for double kindergarten classes only.

The Department of Education disapproves of the use of school facilities for other than school activities, with one exception, the International Red Cross.

The folks of Acton will be pleased to learn that every film approved by the Department for educational purposes has been purchased from the school fund, created through the efforts of staff and children, and these films are on hand, available for individual classes until such time as our assembly hall can again be used.

Truly a fine effort by staff and children and very commendable.

At the close of the meeting, a lovely lunch was served by Mrs. Morrison and Mrs. Matthews.



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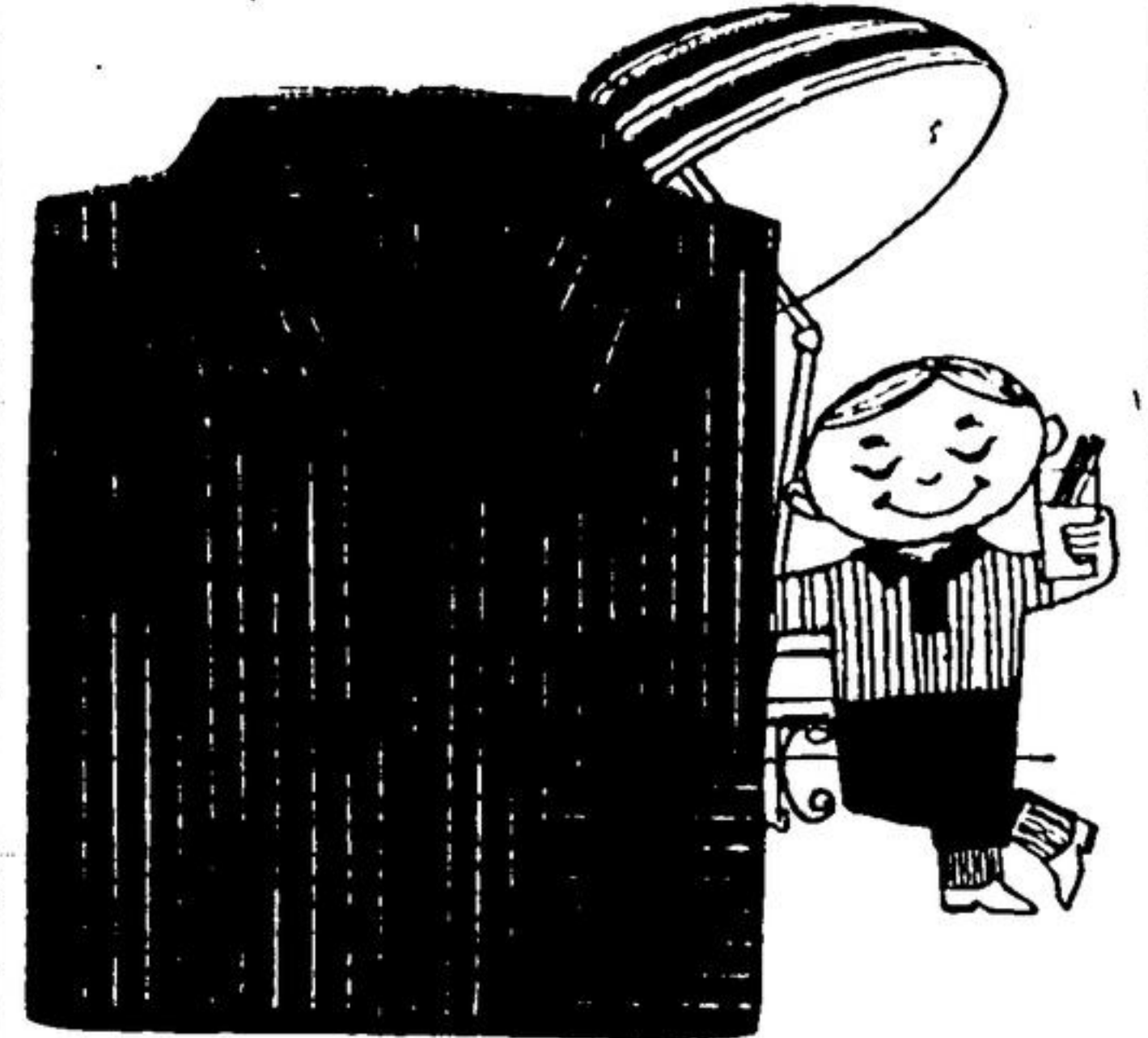
