Mrs. W. Matheson Passes in 81st Year

A kindly neighbor, a wonderful friend, her task completed, passed away on Friday, April 26, 1937, in her 81st year.

Mrs. Wallace Matheson (nee Anne Somerville) leaves her husband, three sons and one daughter, Fyfe of Toronto, Ont., Joan (Mrs. Wesley Beatty) of Guelph, Donald of Hillsburg and Reid of Guelph; two sisters, Miss Minnie Somerville and Mrs. Pearl Kennedy of Acton; and one brother, Dr. William R. Somerville of Halesburg. Three of her brothers, Robert, Russell and George, as well as her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fyfe Somerville, predeceased her. Mr. Fyfe Somerville was a nephew of the great champion for civil and religious liberty, Dr. Robert Alexander Fyfe.

Mr. and Mrs. Matheson were married in Nassagaweya township on June 26, 1907. Their home for many years was on their farm on lot 16 of the fifth line of Erin, and in 1946 they purchased their home in Hillsburg, where they have since resided.

Some are born of distinguished parentage, while others, through their own personality, shine unaided. Mrs. Matheson combined the attributes of both in such a way that her home, her community and her church were permanently enriched by her presence.

Mr. Goldie, pastor of the Hillsburg Baptist church, where she was a member, conducted the services and on Sunday, April 28, she was laid to rest in the Coningsby cemetery, close to her old home and among the scenes she knew so well and the friends who loved her sincerely.
