

Ken Dick Speaks To Rotary Club

Ken Dick, federal Liberal candidate, was the guest speaker at the Rotary Club of Acton Tuesday evening when he reviewed the phenomenal growth of Canada and the Liberal policies that contributed to that development.

The speaker pointed out that the number of immigrants to Canada since the war totaled the population of British Columbia. The effect of this on the economy was emphasized by the fact the municipalities had established 22,000 homes, and acquired 21,000 automobiles as well as clothes, washing machines and other products starting a chain reaction of greater productivity and booming economy.

He emphasized that the fiscal policies of the party had led to a greater distribution of the purchasing power. Mr. Dick cited the beginning of the St. Lawrence Seaway, and the beginning of the world's longest pipeline as indications of the progressive outlook of the Liberal party.

Dealing briefly with the pipe line for natural gas from Alberta, the federal candidate noted the opposition of the minority Tory party. "It is inextricably woven into the warp and woof of our political life that the majority rules. Heaven save us from the political folly of handing power to a party that proposes to change that," the candidate challenged.

Mr. Dick reviewed his service on municipal council, county council, the Halton Manor Board and his work as solicitor for the town of Milton, County Council and County Health Unit. He concluded that on the basis of this experience he was now ready to tackle problems of administration on a national scale.

"I have over the last 10 years fitted myself for the job for which I now offer myself," the speaker concluded.

Mr. Dick was introduced and thanked by President Jim Ledger who noted the club had its second 100 per cent meeting assured in the present attendance contest with the Georgetown club.

"Sandy" Best Addresses Club

"Sandy" Best, Conservative nominee, addressed Acton Y's Men's club Thursday speaking on the growth of Halton.

He noted, in referring to the influx of new Canadians, "It is gratifying to see the importance they place on our great institutions of learning. He emphasized this by pointing out they are resolved to give their children the very best education which Canada has to offer."

The final business session of the Y's Men's club was conducted by president Michael Nellis. A committee was named to further investigate the swimming program and pool plans for the Acton park. It was explained the Parks Board and town council are meeting with the Y's Men to develop these places in the most advantageous manner.

Members were reminded of the International Y's Men's Conference being held in Toronto in July with the Acton club joining other Ontario clubs in playing host to the members of the Christian movement from many countries.

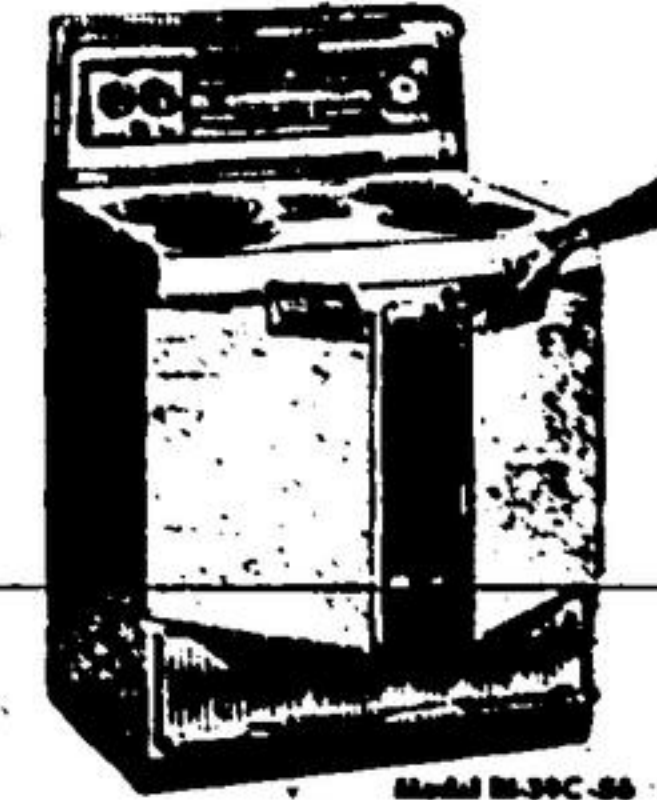
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OBITUARY
