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

Less Money For Ottawa And More For Those Who Earn It

MORE CANADIANS could own new cars if it were not for the present Liberal Government. The tax collectors grab ten per cent of the selling price of every new cer. This money, running into millions, helps to swell those multi-million. dollar surpluses held in Liberal hands

John Diefenbaker, our national leader, said the other day that this unjustifiable form of taxation would be stopped immediately by a Progressive Conservative Government Such action would increase the sale of new cars and create more employment in the motor industry and hundreds of supplier

The Progressive Conservative Party has always led in legislation aimed at benefitting the working man and his family. A glance at the record proves the point. It was the Conservatives who, in 1873, introduced legislation that made it possible for Labour to organize into unions and even to strike without offending the provisions of the Criminal Code it was an Ontario Conservative Government in 1914 that introduced Workmen's Compensation, it was a Conservative Prime Minister (Sir Robert Borden) who appointed the Yirst Trade Union Member as Minister of Labour

It was under the Borden Government in 1918 that legal status was given to Trade Unions with the statutory right to organize for Collective Bargaining, the same government first introduced Federal financial assistance for the Technical Training of Workers, and it was a federal Conservative Government in 1935 that passed legislation providing for a weekly day of rest; the eight hour day and 48-hour week fair trade practices and the establishment of the Unemployment and Social Insurance Commission, and the Trade and Industry Commission Later, when the King Government came into power, all these measures were referred to the Courts and only weakly defended by the Liberals, with the result that many were ruled unconstitutional

On June 10th Canadians will decided their fate for another four years. Will you vote for a Liberal Government interested only in getting more of the people's money? Or will you vote Progressive Conservative and be sure of a Government interested in the people and their problems?
