

50th Anniversary Celebration To Feature Panel Discussion

The 50th anniversary of the inauguration of the Agricultural Representative Service of the Ontario Department of Agriculture is being celebrated at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, on Thursday, June 27. In conjunction with the event, a large exhibit is being erected in the gymnasium at the O.A.C. This will illustrate the various phases of agricultural work carried on by the County "Reps" over the 50 year period. This exhibit, incidentally, will be on display during Farmers' Week at the O.A.C. the dates of which are June 11 to 14 inclusive.

A feature of the celebration on June 27 is to be a panel discussion. A number of the "Ag Reps" who pioneered the service in its early days have been invited to act as panel members. The Halton "Ag Rep" has been asked to chair this panel discussion.

U.S. Agric. Secretary Testifies at Hearing

That was the headline in a U.S. morning paper a few weeks ago. It related to USDA's testimony at the Senate Agricultural Committee hearings on farm program.

What Mr. Benson actually said, we understand, was "Average control is not effective in reducing overall production. The Senate Agricultural Committee, with Mr. Benson's apparent blessing, now seeks to write a bill providing a two-price plan for cotton. Last year everybody who had a chance to say it, said such a plan would work."

Warble Control Not Organized For Halton

A few days ago, one of our prominent Halton livestock men commented, "I noticed in your column recently the suggestion that Halton cattle owners should take action to place the county under the Warble Fly Act." It is long overdue, he added, "because the individual can't control warbles if his neighbors don't do anything about them."

This was substantiated by the number of warble lumps on the backs of a typey bunch of his young cattle we were inspecting at the time. This was the sort of comment we had been waiting for for some time.

As a matter of fact, the subject of Warble Fly Control was discussed with a representative group of Halton cattle owners some three or four years ago. At that time the reaction of the group was lukewarm, to say the least, so nothing materialized. So if there are enough Halton cattle owners who feel and think as our farmer does, then we should be ready to go.

An intimated in a previous article in this column, Halton is the only county in this section of Ontario at least which has done nothing about Warble Fly Control in an organized way.

In our opinion, the cost price squeeze is too serious to overlook ways of cutting costs—and treatment of all cattle for warbles is one of the ways cuts can be cut. So if you are interested, talk it up among your neighbors and we'll get the campaign under way this coming winter.

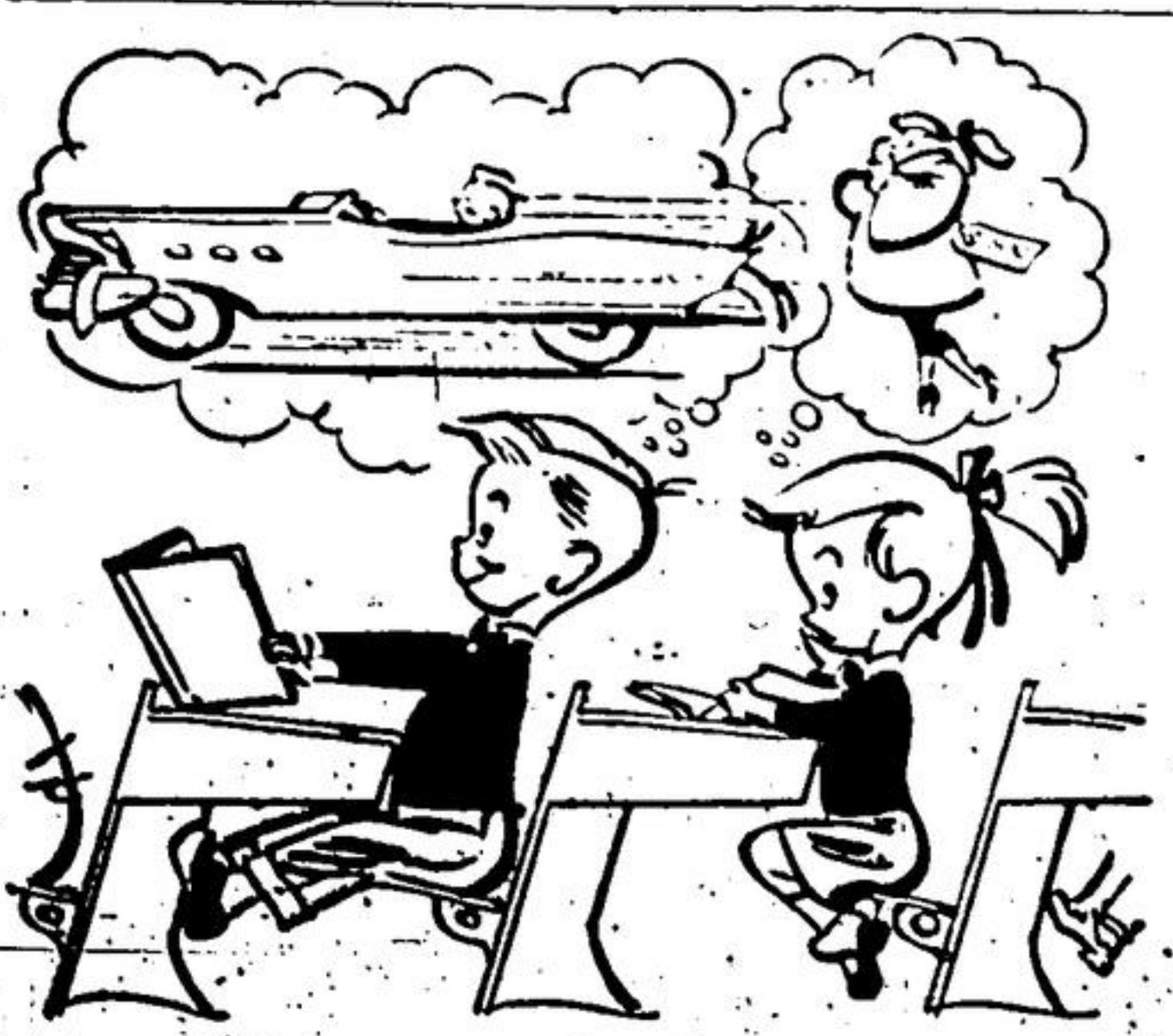

Retirement Savings Plans Eligible for INCOME TAX DEDUCTIONS

The Income Tax Act (Canada) was recently amended to permit individual taxpayers to deduct from their income, within certain limits, premiums paid for retirement savings plans in 1957 and later years.

The savings portion of either a new or an existing life insurance policy may be qualified as a retirement savings plan. Existing life insurance policies therefore need not be surrendered in order to take advantage of this tax relief.

The possible advantages of the deduction should in each case be considered in relation to the restrictions required by law to be included in a savings plan to make it eligible for the deduction, and in relation to the policyholder's own particular tax circumstances.

Policyholders interested in the new deduction should consult their life insurance underwriters or their companies.

High Taxes Turn People Against the Government

IF SOMEONE had told me six months ago that so many Liberals would vote Conservative in this election I would not have believed it. But in the interval public opinion has undergone a drastic change. People have weighed their allegiance to the Liberal party against the dictatorial actions of the present government. For example, one man said to me, "My family has voted Liberal for 100 years. A government has overtaxed causing misery and hardship for thousands. Halton people say, "Let's do something about it—let's vote Progressive Conservative on June 10th."
