

O.A.C. Professor Stresses Need For Better Pasture Management

"We fall down more on pasture management than we do on our milking," stated Professor R. S. Fullerton of the Department of Field Husbandry, O.A.C., when addressing the Halton Farm Management Association in Milton on Wednesday evening of last week.

Birdfoot Trefoil definitely has a place in Ontario agriculture, but don't get the idea that it will ever replace alfalfa in our hay and pasture mixtures, was another of his

comments. The place for Birdfoot Trefoil is on some of our poorer soils where, due to high acidity or poor drainage, alfalfa does not prosper.

September is the month to make your fertilizer applications on pastures and it is also the time when, if possible, grazing should be restricted in order to give the roots an opportunity to store up the necessary plant food. Close pasturing in October is not harmful, aside from

the fact that a reasonable amount of top helps to hold the snow as protection during the winter months.

Johnnan Neelands, president of the Halton Association, was in charge of the meeting, which also included a brief outline by Howard Henry of the Field Crops Branch of the regulations which will govern the Pasture Competition being sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association.

Carroll in his address on May 17 at the twilight meeting of the Halton Holstein Club held in Hays Sales Arena near Trafalgar.

In support of his statement, Mr. Carroll pointed out that in 1907 there were only 200 Holstein breeders in Canada, whereas Halton, despite recent farm real estate activity, still has 201 Holstein breeders.

Mr. Carroll, former assistant deputy minister of agriculture for Ontario and now Peel County manager of the Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co. delighted his audience with his thought-provoking message.

The regulations require that steers, in order to be eligible, must make an average daily gain of one and three-quarter pounds during the five month feeding period.

The 30th annual Ontario Poultry Conference will be held on June 18 to 20, 1957, at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. Prominent poultry scientists from Canada and the United States will speak and give information on the latest findings in poultry science.

Tuesday, June 18, is Poultry Breeders' Day, and the discussions will centre around the problems of breeders. On Wednesday, egg production in its various aspects will be discussed. Thursday morning will be a turkey session and the afternoon will be devoted to the broiler industry.

Crop Condition Due to Weather

Halton farm folk in general would welcome a let-up in moisture and little higher temperatures. Meadows, pastures and the fall wheat got off to a great start this spring. Weather conditions have retarded growth during the past two or three weeks.

We would estimate that 80 to 85 per cent of the intended spring grain acreage was sown. While a small percentage on poorly drained fields have been drowned out, in general, germination has been excellent and with favourable weather, prospects are still bright for good crops.

Frost damage in so far as we can determine has not been as serious as might be interpreted from the daily press and reports over the radio. True, early potatoes, strawberries and tomatoes in particular were hit in the Burlington area, but taking the County as a whole, damage from frost has not been too serious.

In the general farming areas of the county, little if any corn was planted at the end of last week. In most cases, soil conditions in many fields were not conducive to very much hope of planting before the middle of the current week, and that, only providing there is no additional rainfall in the meantime.

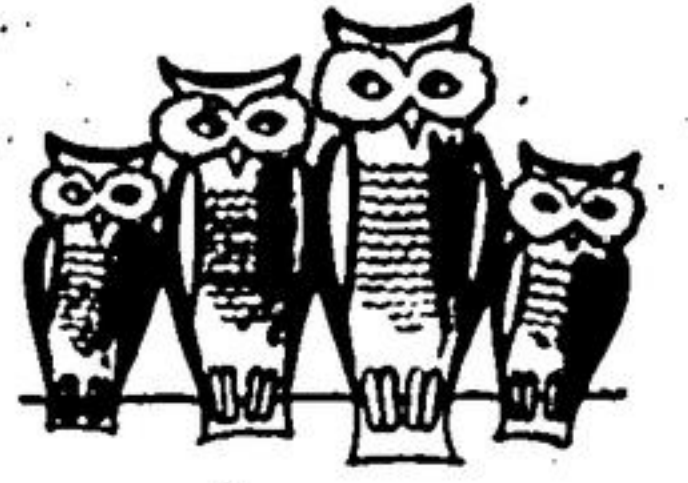
The next game will be held on Tuesday, May 28 at 7:15 p.m. at Eden Mills park with the visiting team of Morrison.
