A Big Question

Rev. G. Lockhart Royal, B.A. Speaks to Decoration Day Crowd

Rev. G. Lockhart Royal, B.A., of Norval, spoke briefly, but very effectively to the crowd assembled at Fairview cemetery for the fourth annual Decoration Day last Sunday.

Choosing as his theme "The Past, Present and Future," he reviewed the distrust and doubt that existed in the past. The present is a time when we must have faith in God.

"Man cannot exist alone. He demands fellowship," he related. With the development of the hydrogen bomb, the dangers of the present come ever closer to us. If one should be dropped on us, not only would we all be killed, but the devastation for miles around would be terrific.

"We must look to God, who gives us courage, faith and hope," stated the speaker.

What has the future for me, my children and my health?" is a question which arises in our minds frequently, Rev. Royal said.

He related that "God calls upon us from the Holy Bible to abide with Him always" and went on to say, "The certainty and hope of tomorrow is found in God. The world will be redeemed, and saved in one name Jesus."

In closing, Rev. Royal said, "Take God into your hearts and keep Him there always."

Led by Grand Marshall Gordon Beatty, the colorful procession headed by Acton Citizens Band moved off from the C.N.R. tracks followed by the color party, Acton Council, Acton Fire Department, Halton Civil Defence, the Boy Scouts and Wolf Cubs.

Marshall Dr. A. J. Buchanan led the second detachment headed by the Guelph Pipe band in their silver pipes and skirling pipes piping in step the Acton Legion Ladies Auxiliary, the Duke of Gloucester and Lakeside Chapters of the D.O.F.E. Women's Institute, Girl Guides and Brownies.

The Guelph Sea Cadet Band led the third and final group in a quacking pace headed by Marshall Vic Patrick, Acton Legion president. In the group were Acton Branch 196 of the Canadian Legion and six Legion members from the district zone.

A brief ceremony was held at the cenotaph. A wreath was placed by George Simpson and John McHugh read the names of Acton servicemen who died in combat followed by the Last Post by Charles Landsborough.

The procession then moved off west on Mill St. and south on Main to Fairview cemetery for the Decoration Day service.

Mayor Ted Tyler expressed words of welcome and pleasure at seeing so much interest shown by the many citizens present.

After the ceremony, veterans dispersed to St. Joseph's and the Pioneer cemeteries to honor the dead by placing of flowers on the graves while at the same time the graves were being decorated in Fairview cemetery.

The clerk treasurer was authorized to pay \$40 to R. Hanusek for painting the assessor's office.

A letter was presented from Eric Scott, 102 Meadowvale Road, requesting a refund of taxes amounting to \$30.50. The letter was to be given to the assessor for his recommendation.

The road committee reported that the source of the flooding had been located at the Y.M.C.A. and five days had been spent in rectifying this matter.

A recommendation was to be forwarded to the Y. Board, suggesting the earthen embankment be repaired to allow the water to flow into the proper drain.

Provide Parking Area

Council agreed to provide a parking area behind the Y.M.C.A. to be designated as parking facilities for municipal offices.

A report from Dr. A. Bull of the Halton County Health Unit showed the water at Fairy Lake to be satisfactory for swimming.

The clerk was instructed to check the minutes following a letter from C. F. Leatfield for his client, William McLeod, stating no permission had been granted for erection of a police light on the building owned by Mr. McLeod.

Council repealed the garage closing by-law, to take effect Wednesday, June 5 at 7 a.m.

A by-law was passed to provide additional grants for the two holdbacks on the paving program and the Maria Street bridge.

Stage Coach Visit

A letter was received from Ross Pearen, Milton Centennial chairman, requesting supervision of a suitable area for the Centennial Stage Coach, to visit Acton on June 10.

The stage coach would arrive at the municipal offices at 9:30 and the town crier would summon all residents to be present at the Mil-

Two Brothers Meet After 44 Year Period

A pleasant surprise was in store for Pliny Fetterly of 179 Guelph Street, recently, when he was visited by his brother, Arthur George, who is living in El Paso, Texas.

The two brothers parted 44 years ago in Cornwall, Ont., when A. G. Fetterly, at the age of 17 ventured to London to try his hand at farming for a few short months before he moved across the border to El Paso.

He took a position as a housekeeper in San Francisco in 1913 and worked there for a number of years before finally settling in Texas. He married after going to Texas.

Both brothers served in the armed forces. Arthur in the American Army and Pliny in the Canadian Forces.

The future of the Acton plant of the Wool Combing Corporation is today uncertain. A telephone interview with Robert Markon at 1 p.m. today revealed a meeting of the Board of Directors was in progress to decide on the future of the Acton plant.

He indicated no definite statement would be available before Monday. Rumors have been prevalent locally that the industry would be shut down and no denial of these rumors has been received.

This morning it was expected an announcement would be made by 2:30 p.m. today, but this was not possible, Mr. Markon explained.

About 100 employees would be presently affected if the plant is closed with a loss to the town of a quarter million dollar annual payroll.

Local officials at the plant could offer no comment on the situation but the possibility of the plant closing down was not denied.

Commenting on the possibility of the plant closing, Mayor Tyler described it as a severe blow to the town affecting every businessman as well as the employees themselves.

The possibilities of new industry are being continually promoted. Two possible plants are presently being negotiated with but nothing is at any state of finalization, the Mayor commented.

Frank Terry, chairman of the Acton Chamber of Commerce also described the possible loss as a blow to the town of Acton. He declared the Chamber would work with any group to get other industries interested in Acton.

Mr. Markon told the Free Press that in the event of the plant closing, the Mayor would be asked to go to the provincial government to discuss the problem as one of the highest importance of local importance.

It is expected that an announcement on the results of the meeting Board of Directors of the Wool Combing Corporation Ltd. will be issued on Monday. Mr. Markon concluded.
