Canadian Chamber of Commerce  
Urges Get-Out-Vote Campaign

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce announced today that it has launched a national, non-partisan "Get out the Vote" campaign. To make the program fully effective right across the country, Canada's national business organization is enlisting the aid of its some 700 member Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce and some 2,300 member companies.

These groups, representing a cross-section of the country's business and community life, are asked to co-operate in an all out effort to encourage people to go to the polls on June 10. They will bring into play such things as literature, lectures, speakers, door-to-door campaigns, posters. Throughout the campaign, the Canadian Chamber will co-operate fully with the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada which is also conducting a national "Get out the Vote" campaign. The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada has a membership of 25,000 young businessmen and 280 local units across Canada.

"Democracy depends upon the exercise of the free and secret ballot," stated President Raymond Dupuis of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. "Citizens should keep informed, only an informed electorate can put to effective use the full value and worth of the franchise—they should make sure their names are on the voters' lists and most important of all, on election day, June 10, they should vote."

The forces opposing our democratic way of life are assisted by apathy. Poor government and loss of freedom are the end results of indifference. We must therefore be alert and vigilant in the defence of democracy through the recognition and exercise of the responsibilities of citizenship."

Mr. Dupuis said that in the last General Election in 1953, over two

and a half million registered Canadian voters failed to take the trouble to visit a polling booth. "Democracy," he warned, "as we know it, cannot long survive this kind of indifference."
