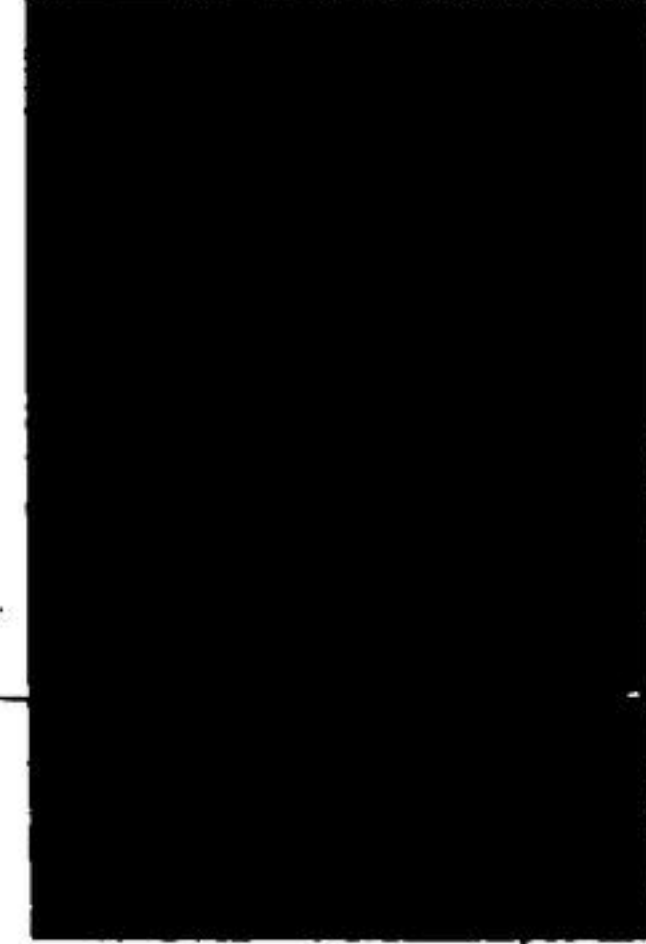

Here's How

Car Washing Requires Skill

What do you keep in your garage? Do you use it as a storehouse in which you keep everything from the lawn mower to that horrible picture of Aunt Sadie?

A leading Canadian automobile service authority points out that the garage was built to house your car and, for the sake of the car, should be used for that purpose.

Tests have shown, states J. A. Dykes, director of service for Chrysler of Canada, "that being left outdoors in all weather conditions seriously shortens the life span of the finish on your car."

Using plenty of water, so as to avoid all possible abrasive action on the paint.

Do use a soft sponge and gentle pressure to remove the dirt. If, over a period of time, the finish seems to lack lustre, clean it thoroughly with a mild auto detergent.

Dykes suggested that a process known as "pre-polishing" will bring out the true beauty of the finish. In this process, no covering wax is applied to the finish, but rather a special water-thin liquid is used which seals the pores of the paint.



"Indeed," he continued, "tests conducted by leading paint manufacturers show that the most harmful weather condition to automobile finish is the heavy dew that falls on a car during the night."

Dykes points out that there are a few simple "Do's" and "Don'ts" in the care of auto finish that will greatly increase the life span of that finish.

Do not wash a car while it is standing in the hot sun, or immediately after it has been moved out of the sun.

Do not use extremely hot water.

Do not use harsh detergents or cleaning materials on the finish.

This includes many of the household detergents commonly used for this purpose.

Do not use detergents or waxes of any kind on the finish of a new car until the paint has had an opportunity to "cure." This takes approximately three months.

Do wash your car in the shade, drying it thoroughly before exposing it to the sun.

Do wash frequently, more often in the winter than in summer,

Doctors Pledge Hospital \$15,000

OAKVILLE — Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial hospital's 33 doctors have pledged \$15,000 to help eliminate the hospital's \$275,000 deficit, general campaign chairman A. S. Ballingal said this week.

Up eight per cent. in the past week, contributions now total \$130,000 or 48 per cent. of the total. Only 25 per cent. of the general canvassers have as yet reported.

An expert on atomic medicine has declared it would be "inexcusable" for the United States to "jeopardize" the safety of the free world by halting tests of nuclear weapons.

Dr. Shields Warren told a U.S. Senate - House of Representatives atomic sub-committee at Washington: "I firmly believe as a physician that it is inexcusable for us to jeopardize our own safety and that of the rest of the world in order to eliminate a risk of as low an order of magnitude as is constituted by any reasonable program of atomic weapons testing."

The "risk" referred to is the risk of disease, deformity and death from the radioactive fall-out of an atomic explosion.

Dr. Warren's testimony supported the position taken by Dr. Wilford F. Libby, a member of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission and a nuclear scientist.

Dr. Libby has just written the committee that the U.S. cannot halt atomic tests if it is to develop the modern weapons "urgently needed for our defence."

Other scientists, including Dr. Linus Pauling, a Nobel Prize winner, are calling for an end to the tests because of the fall-out hazard.

Stimulating Process

President Eisenhower's foreign aid bill cleared its first hurdle last week, but emerged slimmer by more than \$200,000,000. The Senate foreign relations committee in approving the bill, cut \$27,000,000 from the presidential request for \$2,840,000,000 for United States military and economic aid to free-world countries in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

But the measure faces rough going this week on the floor of the Senate. In the face of the current congressional economy drive some had expected deeper cuts in the committee.

The Senate committee wrote in a clause drafted by the Senate Republican leader, William F. Knowland of California, permitting a continuation of assistance to Communist Yugoslavia if the president is convinced it is in the interest of American security and if congressional committees are kept informed "continuously" of the projected aid.

Back on Suez

France has decided to end her lone boycott of the Suez Canal and has offered to pay shipping tolls in sterling, it was announced by the Egyptian foreign ministry at Cairo. A French spokesman said at Paris that "contracts have taken place about this matter between French and Egyptian banks," but declined further comment.

An Egyptian spokesman said negotiations are going on through the Swiss embassy in Cairo for resumption of French shipping through the Canal.

All the main Suez Canal users:

countries except France had lifted their boycott last month, after agreeing provisionally to pay tolls directly to Egypt's nationalized canal authority.

Britain decided on May 14 to permit her ships to resume use of the waterway, and French business interests were reported to have since exerted heavy pressure on their government to lift the boycott.

Travelling Beds

Russia's Communist party chief, Khrushchev, made a strong bid for Finnish popular support in a speech at a mass meeting in Helsinki last Saturday.

In the first two days of their state visit to Finland, Khrushchev and Soviet Premier Bulganin had been assured of the support of the Finnish government's official friendship and support.

But the Finnish people in general treated the visiting Russians as a curiosity. They watched silently as the two made sightseeing tours of Helsinki. They had gathered in small knots during the Russians' half-dozen previous public appearances, with a few scattered sympathizers raising a cheer.

African Quints Die

A young Portuguese doctor, his wife and a nun struggled vainly to save the lives of quintuplets born last week to a 30-year-old African woman at Laurence Marques in Portuguese East Africa.

Mrs. Coline Chulomane Covine, who has nine children born as twins, triplets and quads, was receiving congratulations on the birth of the quintuplets when she learned they were dying. The four boys and girl averaged two pounds, 14 ounces in weight, and were a month premature. Two days after birth, the last of the quintuplets died.

The mother is a Christian and a member of the Shangan tribe of the Zulul. Her husband, 40-year-old Silvestre Nadihane, is a cripple who earns \$40 a month as domestic servant to a Portuguese family.

Monday Observance

The Supreme Court of Ontario has dismissed a move by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to be exempted from prosecution for alleged violation of the Lord's Day Act.
