Delegation of Irate Farmers Already Ask 401 Service Road

TRAFALGAR — A service road from the Seventh Line to Town Line East, south of the new Highway 401, which is to be constructed south of Hornby, was requested last week before Trafalgar township council by a delegation of farmers, headed by Stanley Hall, M.P.P. for Halton.

Mr. Hall told council that when the highway is constructed, present plans call for a semi-cloverleaf at the Seventh Line; closing of the Eighth Line at the highway; an overpass at the Ninth Line; closing of the Tenth Line; and an overpass at the Tenth Line.

This, he said, will result in

Council approved a motion requesting the road, and agreed to furnish Mr. Hall with a copy for use in connection with future negotiations with the department.

School children will also be affected, he said, as will cream trucks and delivery men. Land on the service road, Mr. Hall said, is already owned by the Ontario Department of Highways.

Construction of such a service road, he pointed out, would be performed by the department as part of the highway project, and it would then be handed over to the township, which would be responsible for its maintenance.

CATTLE PRODUCERS

A Public Hearing will be held at the following time and place
JUNE 20 FERGUS BEATTY'S HALL 2 P.M. D.S.T.

For the purpose of considering and discussing a proposal by the Ontario Beef Producers' Association to levy a license fee at the rate of 10 cents per head on all cattle and 5 cents per head on calves for each head slaughtered for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Association in carrying out its objects of stimulating, increasing, and improving the marketing of Ontario cattle for slaughter through advertising, education and research or other means.

The meeting will be chaired by an officer of the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board. A representative of the Ontario Beef Producers' Marketing Board. A representative of the Ontario Beef Producers' Association will be present to outline the plan.

Before the Farm Products Marketing Board may approve the proposed plan by order, it must be satisfied that 60 per cent of the producers are in favor of the proposal.

All cattle producers are urged to attend and express their views on the proposed plan.
