

Acton Crowd Cries Robber As Umpire Reverses Decision

The weather was hot, Dundas was hot, the crowd was hot, but Acton Intermediate failed to warm up to the pitch as they went down to defeat 12-6 last Saturday to Dundas.

Using the hit-and-run play to advantage, Dundas snowed Acton under 15-0 in the first five and a half innings, before they broke through with two runs.

Battling around in the first inning, Dundas scored four runs as Acton, struggling to shake off the errors and bad throws, were helpless to check them until Young for the opposition, hit a hard drive to Skilling for the third out.

Skilling, leading off for Acton, hit through second and stole second and third as the next two batters fled out to Knox, Dundas center fielder Scott walked, stole second, putting runners on second and third, but P. Lawson failed to come through with a hit, retiring the side.

Beckett, no doubt discouraged by the lack of support afforded him, struck out the first two batters and McCrystal threw out number three.

Cunningham, for Acton went down swinging H Lawson singled, stole second and trotted to third on Bruce's single. Beckett came to bat for Acton but never got a chance to swing the bat as Dundas, behind the plate for Dundas, picked Bruce off at first, and North, Dundas hurler, picked H Lawson off at third to retire the side.

Dundas, playing heads up ball, raked out three more runs in the first of the third.

Beckett, leading off for the locals, struck out, and Skilling received the first of four walks during the game and using his douc-like running, stole second and rided third on an overthrown ball, was tagged out at home Don Anderson fled out for number three.

Apparently Oikawa had witnessed a similar call by umpire-in-chief Mike Timmis in an earlier game this year and ruled it accordingly.

Play resumed with taunting from both teams and a voice of protest from the Acton bench.

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Esqueusing Signs Fire Agreement For Georgetown

At their meeting May 31, Esqueusing councillors requested the town of Acton to grant an extension of the fire fighting agreement with the township for 90 days.

The by-law to amend the township for the year 1957 was given the required three readings. Council approved the detaching of a portion of Township School Area No. 1 of Toronto Township, and the attaching of the portion to Ching-tanousy West school area.

Accounts totalling \$9 were paid. All Bridges of Hourly Wm. Alexander of Norval and A. N. Stark of Georgetown for shooting. Other accounts approved for payment included Town of Milton \$100 for two fire, Art Scott Motors in Georgetown \$11.00 for gas, etc. Levey and Holve, audit fees of \$677.00, telephone \$14.75, cleaning woman, \$25 and Hampton Hydro, \$20.00 on Norval street lights.

At the June meeting it was decided to purchase a calculator at a price of \$900.
Permission was given to pay road accounts totalling \$4,282.19, for accounts to Harold Sheppard of Terra Cotta C. E. Harrington of Georgetown and Derrick Barnsley of Norval totalling \$750. Total Provincial treasury \$592 for in-

Fullin; City of Hamilton, \$78.00 for relief; H.E.P.C. \$4.01 for Norval light repairs; G. C. Brown, \$64.50 for insurance; A. W. Benton, \$5 for stamps, and \$60.95 for convention expense.
