

The parking problem at the park posed a headache for the Park Board at their regular meeting last Monday night in the town hall.

How to keep the cars off the grass area at the park was a problem for the board. A discussion took place on the possibility of providing a parking area at one side of the race track, excluding the swimming area and to have the parking supervised.

It was agreed to make the race track at the park a one-way road running anti-clockwise and that parking be provided on one side, except where the signs state otherwise.

It was suggested to hire Jack Bruce for the next four Sundays to police the park and check on parking, speeding, and vandalism.

Mr. Bruce was hired to supervise the swimming pool for the summer months, and to check on parking and speeding at the park.

Approval was granted the Scottish Country Dance Club to hold a Garden Party in the Acton Park on September 7.

Alert Swimmer Rescues Local Youth In Near Drowning Incident at Park

A drowning fatality was avoided at Acton Park last Saturday when Donald Thomson, R.R. 1, Acton, was rescued by S. A. Rainford, 215 Wyndford Place, Acton.

Like many others, Mr. Thomson had entered the waters of Fairy Lake to cool off during the heat wave, and not being a strong swimmer, he apparently stepped out beyond his depth and soon found himself in difficulties.

Mr. Rainford, sitting on the bank watching the swimmers, noticed someone in difficulty and called to her husband, who was in the water at the time. Being an average swimmer, Mr. Rainford swam to the spot where the young man was going down for the third time and grasping him by the hair, pulled Mr. Thomson to shore.

Several bystanders assisted in hauling the unconscious lad onto the shore and applied artificial respiration immediately.

The firemen were summoned but before their arrival the swimmer had regained consciousness and soon returned to his home.

In an interview with Mrs. Thomson, big boy's mother, it was stated he slept a large part of Sunday but seemed not to suffer any after effects from his experience.
