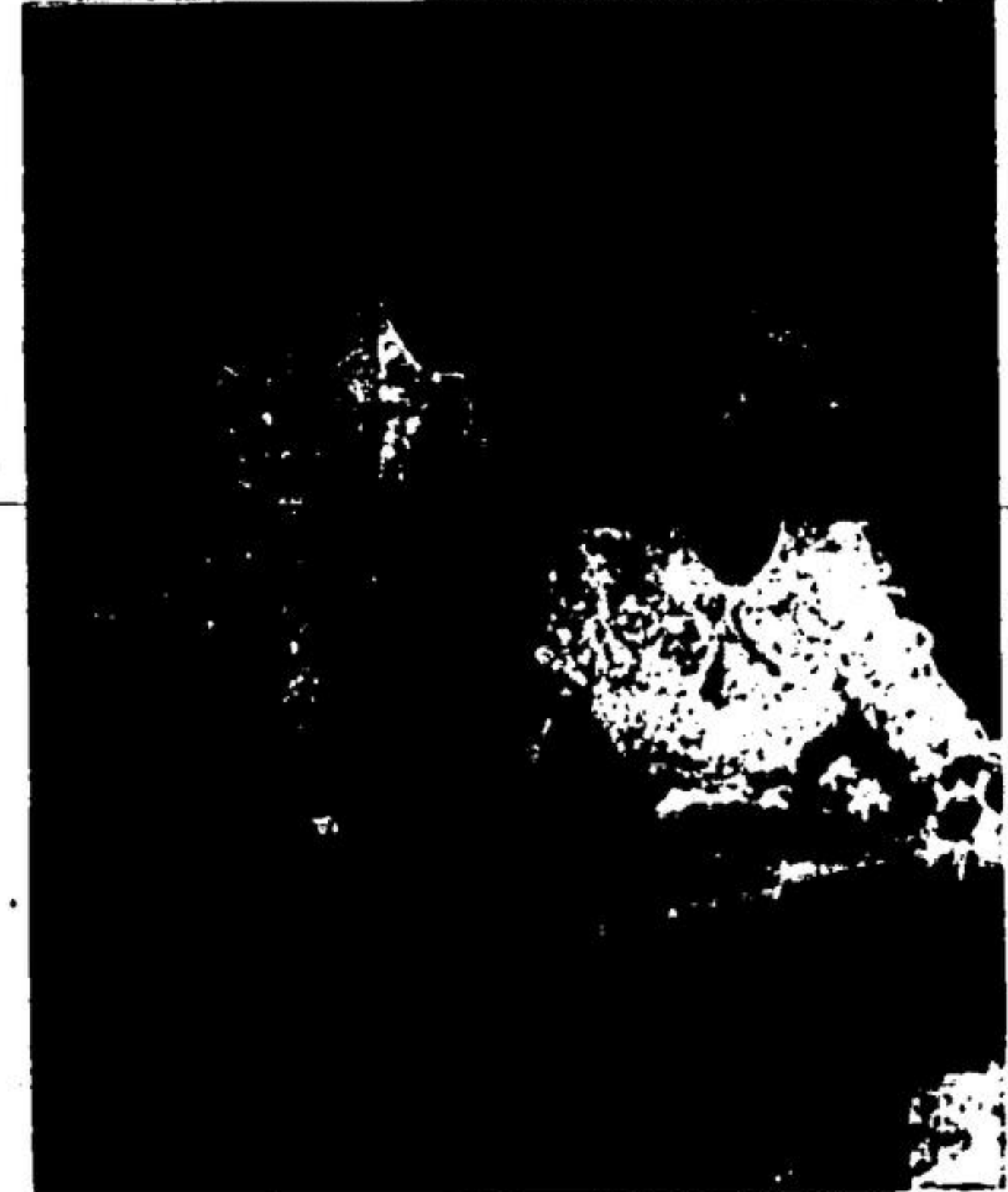
Following sports, all sat down to well laden tables to do justice to the good things provided by the ladies of the church.
