Brother Acton Woman
G. Stuart Martin Dies

An employee of General Motors for 21 years, George Stuart Martin died at the family residence, 114 Athol street east in Oshawa, on Friday, July 19, in his 67th year. He had been in poor health for over a year.

Born at Georgetown, Ontario, on November 28, 1890, the deceased was a son of the Mr. and Mrs. John Martin.

As a young man, Mr. Martin homesteaded in western Canada and lived in Toronto prior to moving to Oshawa 23 years ago. He was an employee of General Motors at the time of his death and was a member of Local 232, UAW.

He leaves his wife, the former Nellie Henry Clifford and a step daughter, Mrs. Lorne Peever (withal) of Bloomfield.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Sarah McDougall of Winnipeg and Mrs. Margaret McArthur of Acton and two brothers, James of Saskatchewan and Ray of California.

The memorial service was held at the Armstrong Funeral Chapel at 2 p.m. on Monday, July 22, followed by interment in Mount Lawn Cemetery. Rev. R. A. Bombay, minister of the Oshawa Pentecostal Church, Simcoe street south, conducted the services.

Local 4-H Club Members Enjoy
Bus Trip to Hamilton District

Members of the Acton 4-H Grain and Tractor Maintenance Clubs accompanied by club leaders were among 88 Halton County 4-H boys and girls and leaders who enjoyed the annual bus trip which centered around points of interest in the Hamilton district. Also included in the group was a young farm girl from Wales, Tony Morris who is in Canada on an exchange visit and who is presently a guest at the Milton farm of A. T. Woodley.

The first stop was at the mammoth industrial empire of the Steel Company of Canada which covers 500 acres of land and produces yearly over two million tons of basic steel for Canadian industry. Here the group was conducted on an extensive tour by guides who explained the manufacture of steel from unloading of ore boats, through the many complex processes of refining to the mill where huge ingots are reduced to the materials used by every manufacturer of steel products.

The second stop was at the farm of the Mountain Sanatorium where manager Andy Gushart explained the operations of the 500-acre farm and told the group that a herd of 125 Ayreshire is maintained to supply 1,000 TB patients and hospital staff. Mrs. Gushart and daughter served delightful refreshments on the spacious lawn.

The final stop was at the Ancaster farm of Jerome Brose, whose specialty is growing of potatoes and field radishes. Owner St. Clair Jerome explained that the fourth crop of radishes was being harvested at the time of the visit.

Small Cheese Plant
Emphasizes Quality

WOODSTOCK, Ont. (CP)—Lloyd Peat, manager of a small cheese factory in Oxford County, says it has set records unknown to most residents of the area.

It is believed the only cheese factory in Western Ontario using a clarifier to remove all sediment from milk Mr. Peat claims it has produced the highest percentage of first-grade cheese in Oxford County.

The federal government allows a two-cent per pound premium on all finished cheddar cheese that rates a score of 94 or 93 last year, out of 100 boxes of cheese manufactured by Mr. Peat and his assistant, Dave Lester, 3,200 rated a score of 93, and 750 boxes rated 94.

To reach this premium, the cheese must have a fine texture, an even color and a compact finish.

Every day 1,500 gallons of milk from a six-mile radius turns up at the factory to be processed into cheddar cheese or butter. "We made 12,000 pounds of butter last year and easily sold it all," says Peat.

The plant, at the corner of two county roads in the area of north Norwich, was built in 1904.

Driverless Car
Hit Empty Truck

A real story for Ripley occurred on St. Lawrence's busy business thoroughfare when two driverless motor vehicles collided near the intersection of Queen and Main Streets.

Several pedestrians and a number of parked vehicles escaped injury and damage when a driverless car owned by Fred Campbell, manager of Dominion Wood Heel Corp. Ltd., parked on the east side of Queen street with the engine running but unattended started to run away. It proceeded down the street for almost a block with care passing it on either side until it veered to the left near the War Memorial and collided with a parked truck owned by Canada Bread.

The driver of the bread truck, Eddie Hyatt, was making a delivery and when returning to his vehicle he noticed the driverless Campbell car coming down the street. He called to his brother, who was standing nearby to halt the machine but before anything could be done it crashed into the front left of the truck. Damage to the bread truck was over \$100 with little more than a scratch on the Campbell car.

Passenger Liner
Queen Elizabeth
Is Floating Town

HALIFAX (CP)—"What time does this place arrive in port," quipped a recent passenger on the liner Queen Elizabeth, on a trip in which she stopped at Halifax.

The man was not entirely joking. The 33,837-ton floating giant is more like a town than a ship in many respects.

One of the largest restaurants in the world, a night club, a 338-seat theatre, a permanent "population" of more than 1,200 and a transient population of more than 2,300 go to make the Queen more than just a ship to many people.

"Four times around the promenade deck and you've covered a mile," say Cunard Line officers who guide activity aboard the 1,001-foot liner. The promenade is 724 feet from one end to the other.

The liner's Verandah Grill is called "the night club of the North Atlantic." The main dining room can accommodate 700 persons, about the maximum of first class passengers. She sports home-grown flowers and a large, painting of Queen Mother Elizabeth, sponsor of the ship, hangs in the first-class lounge. It was painted by Oswald Bailey.

Passengers can follow the liner's progress during the ocean passage by a model of the ship which moves across a large map of the Atlantic as the voyage proceeds.

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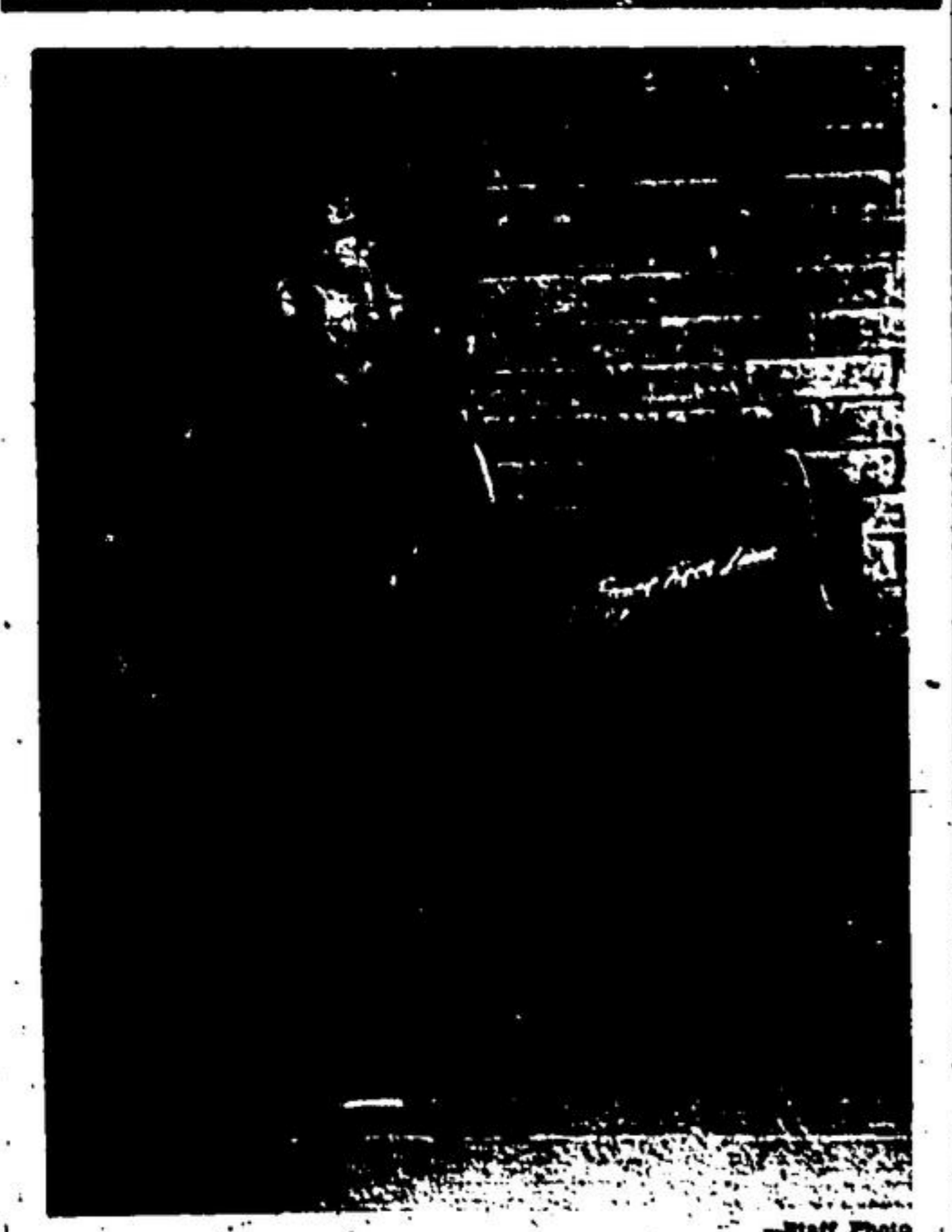
