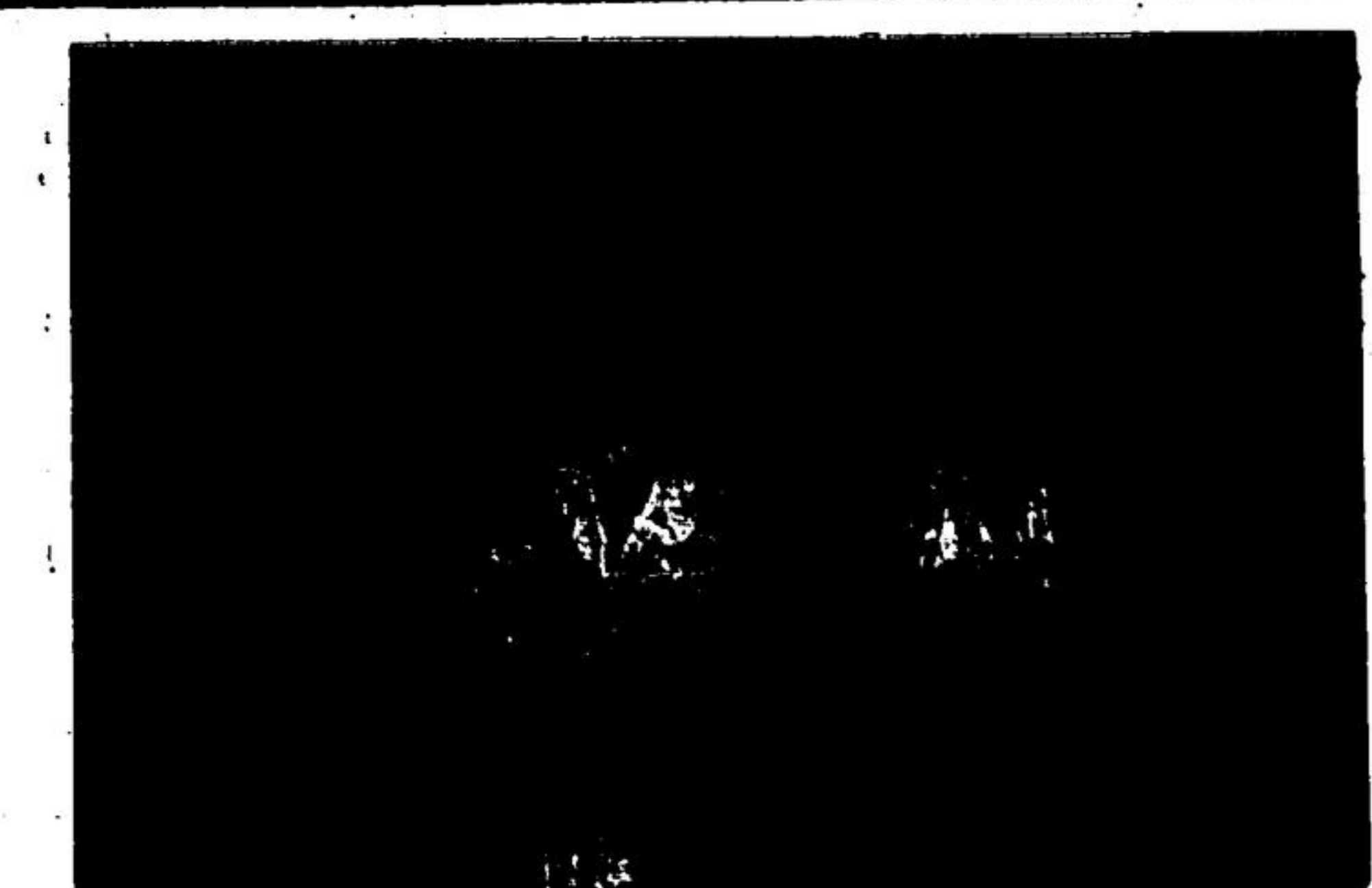

Summer Care of Lawns Outlined By Department of Horticulture

How much are lawn grasses damaged by heat and drought during the hot dry weather of summer? Not seriously, states J. C. Taylor, Department of Horticulture, Ontario Agricultural College. A lawn may look brown for awhile, but it recovers quickly when the weather becomes cool and rain falls. During the hot summer period, a sound watering program will help greatly in maintaining a green lawn. It doesn't make much difference at what time of day the watering is carried out, says the O.A.C. authority. However, on lawns in which there is a lot of bentgrass it is not wise to water the lawn in the evening, because this practice encourages diseases like brownpatch, which attacks bentgrasses. In such cases, watering should be done early in the day so that the water can dry off before nightfall. But it is important to remember that when a lawn is watered, it should get a thorough soaking, rather than a light sprinkling. A light application of water soon evaporates, but its worst fault is that it tends to encourage shallow rooting of the grass, and at the same time, confers its greatest benefit on surface-rotting weeds, such as crab grass.

Don't Be Alarmed Mutual Aid Plans Practice

Sometime within the next two weeks, the fire alarm will be sounded summoning the firemen to the fire hall. Don't be alarmed. It isn't a major catastrophe—only preparation in the event of one. A Halton County Mutual Fire Aid practice will be held in Milton sometime during the next two weeks, but which night is known only to the Fire Marshall's office. The phony "alarm" will be sounded and eight trucks with at least six men on each truck, will race to Milton. It is expected they will arrive within 20 minutes of the sounding of the alarm. The firemen will work fast to set up 8,000 feet of hose somewhere in the town (the location is also secret at the present time) and will pump water the whole distance of the hoses. In other practice runs in the past, the firemen have worked on their own trucks with their own men, and the water was pumped from truck to truck. This time the units will set up tarpaulin basins and each truck will pump from one basin to the next. The men will be taken from their own trucks to work with firemen from other towns on other trucks—another method of ensuring close co-operation and timing among the eight brigades. Halton was the first county to adopt the mutual fire aid system whereby equipment and teachings are standardized so that each unit could work with another in cases of emergency.
