## Major Expansion Program for Free Press Adds Metropolitan-Type Press to Plant

Copies of this newspaper will, with this issue and in the future, be printed from 1400 pound rolls containing nine miles of newsprint loaded on the front of the press. As the paper streams through the complicated mechanism it will be printed and folded with the machine delivering completed sections.

Mr. Dills reviewed that investigation of the installation had been underway for the past three years and necessitated a plant addition of 31 feet by 35 feet with a specially constructed pit, and new stereotyping room.


The 15 ton machine, transported from Chicago by transport in pieces, will produce papers at the rate of 3,500 an hour, eight pages at a time. Formerly the paper was printed four pages at a time with each sheet being fed by hand at the rate of 1,000 an hour. Folding followed on a separate machine.

Speaking of the heavy investment involved, the firm's president described the move as a vis-


ion toward a progressive future as evidenced by the tremendous growth in this part of Ontario and in Halton particularly. This press could handle a small daily newspaper without taxing its capacity and provision has been made to double this press installation in the future, if necessary," Mr. Dills noted in outlining the extent of the installation.

Describing the addition of the color service, Mr. Dills pointed out "the advent of color printing as applied to flat bed newspaper presses is something that, while entirely new, has become quite a necessity in order to keep abreast of modern trends especially advertising

"This installation is the answer to the dream of editors of smaller dailies and weeklies to offer the advertiser some method of supplying color that could be adapted to newspaper pages printed on a flat bed press a method whereby the cost would not be prohibitive to both publisher and advertiser," the president noted.

Final phases of assembly are being reached as the erector and pressman Albert Schupp make adjustments on the press tha is expected to speed the newspaper printing process by six times.
