

Following Acton council meeting Tuesday at which arrangements were made for the development of an industrial acreage, it was learned Wednesday that firm options had been signed for the entire 70 acre J. J. Stewart farm on Main St. north.

Plens to extend McDonald Blvd west, indicate a new industry will be located near that area of the farm and bordering the C.N.R. tracks. Plans for a railway spur line were known to have been prepared three years ago by the C NR for such a development.

In an interview Mr. Stewart confirmed his signing of the option for his entire farm with possible occupancy to August 21 and occupancy of the house for an additional six months. He noted the town was purchasing part of the land to provide roads for future development and the balance was being purchased by an unnamed corporation.

Test holes drilled on the site would indicate a fairly large type of industry but no actual building size, employment potential, firm name or products could be obtained for publication.

opment of a 65-arre parcel of industrial land when Acton Council Tuesday approved purchase of an estimated 10 scree of land for roads and future water site; approved extension of water and sewer lines and called for specifications on a culvert necessary to instal the extended McDonald Blvd.

Land purchased by the town inriuded a road area surrounding the J. J. Stewart property to provide for future development and a water supply site located several years ago but not available at the ime. Cost of the land was \$30,000.

A 447 foot road extension from McDonald Blvd west to the property line, including a culvert over a swamp ares, was approved by council R. V. Anderson and Associales were to draw up the specifications and the work is to be done by the lown workmen under the supervision of the town foreman. Approval was granted for the

continuation of the sewer and water main from McDonald Blvd. for a distance of 147 feet to the property line with estimates to be given by the Public Utilities department and the work carried out by this department.

The cost of this work was to be borne out of current revenue and no loan or debentures issued.

It was understood at the meeting the balance of the J. J. Stewart property amounting to approximately 60-65 acres was to be used for industrial development.

C. F. Leatherland, acting town solicitor, was instructed to close I the deal for the purchase of the town's portion of the J. J. Stewart property.

A letter of objection from R. H. Elliott to the spartment building project proposed for the corner of Mill and Elgin Streets was submitted to council.

Mr. Elliott expressed alarm a the concentration of people the building would lead to in this small area. He suggested a concentration of 63 persons on the one-fifth acre lot was exhorbitant and compared it with that of city tenement areas
