Rotary Club District Governor Attends Acton Club Meeting

The Rotary Club of Acton was host to E. P. Brettell, Governor of 3071 District of Rotary International, who is making his annual official visit to each of the 41 Rotary Clubs in this section of Ontario. He addressed the local club Tuesday night and conferred with President Bill Matlock, Secretary Ted Hansen and committee chairmen on Rotary administration and service activities.

Governor Brettell, in his address to the Acton club, outlined the general foundation of the club as a whole. He stressed the principles and objectives of the organization, giving the local club many ideas for community work.

Mr. Brettell was born and educated in England in the Midlands and served in the First Great War of 1914-1918. After receiving his discharge with the rank of lieutenant, he came to Canada in 1923. He joined the Cooksville Rotary Club soon after his arrival in this country.

He is a member and Past-President of the Rotary Club of Mississauga and was elected as District Governor of Rotary International for the 1957-58 fiscal year at Rotary's 68th Annual Convention in Lucerne, Switzerland, last May. He is one of 240 District Governors supervising the activities of more than 9,500 Rotary Clubs which have a membership of 446,000 business and professional executives in 102 countries throughout the free world.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, the local president appoints a committee of three to four members to discuss the Governor's visit. Their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Acton because they are based on the same general objectives: developing

better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men; promoting community betterment; undertaking, raising the standards of business and professions and bettering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among all the peoples of the world.

Each year, the world-wide service organization conducts a series of projects in numerous and in strength. During the past fiscal year, 341 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 41 countries of South America and Central America, Europe, Asia, Africa and the Islands of the Pacific, and six countries were added to Rotary's roster: Cambodia, French Cameroun, French Equatorial Africa, Guadeloupe, Liechtenstein and Uganda.

Acton Runner Does it Again

Bruce Andrews of Acton, runner for the Guelph Legion Track Club, continued his great running as he placed first in the provincial one mile under 16 years at the 15th Annual Empire-Bigley Memorial Track Meet held in Toronto on Saturday.

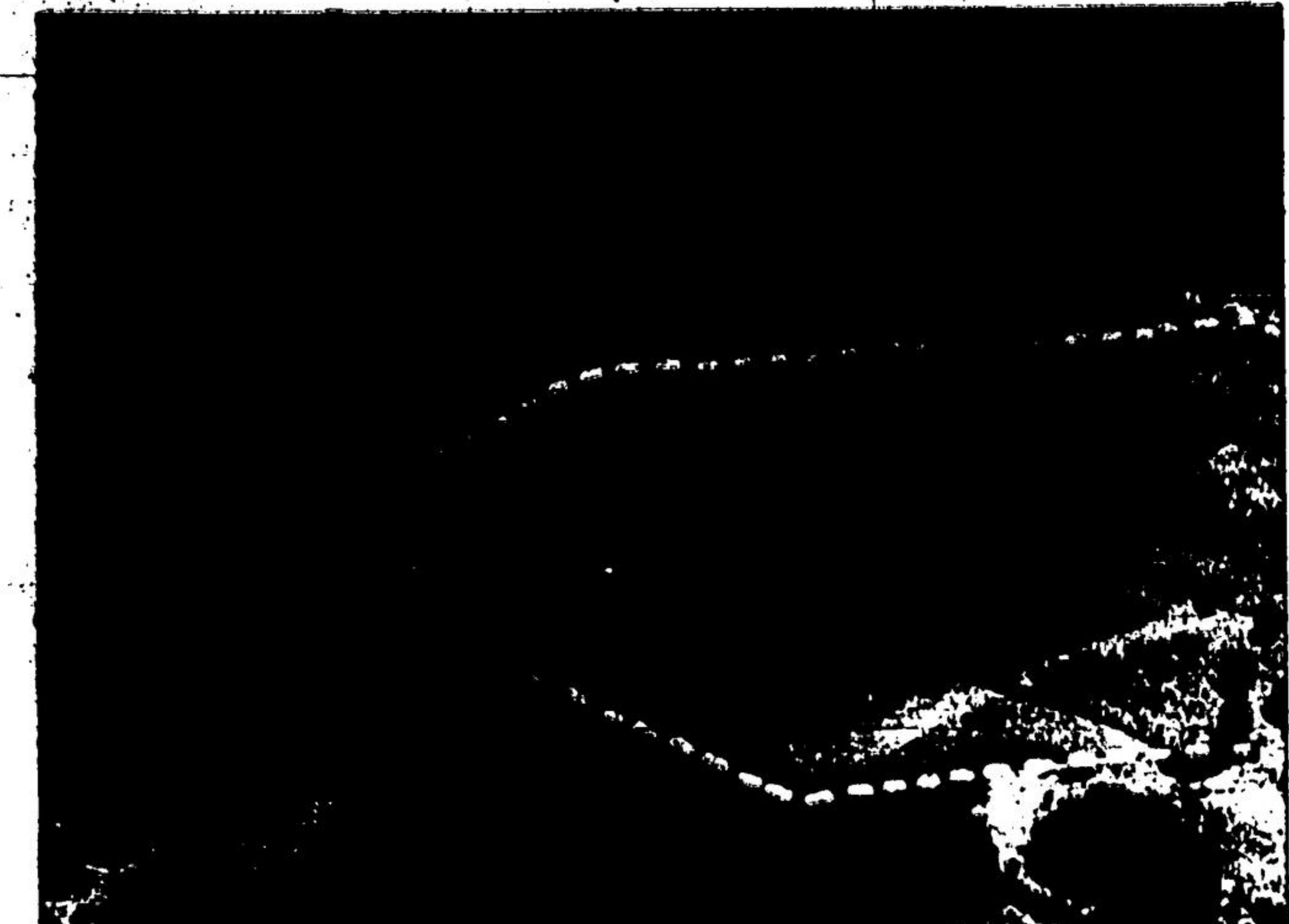

Red Cross Blood Clinic Scheduled for August 29

Acton Legion Auditorium will again be the scene of a Blood Donor Clinic on Thursday, August 29. Residents of Acton and district will give their blood voluntarily, as in the past two years, in order to supply a blood bank of the Canadian Red Cross Society. This blood is used in case of need of a blood transfusion at no cost to the patient.

At the present time, the Red Cross operates its transfusion service in the Hamilton, Niagara Peninsula, Galt, Guelph, Brantford and Lakehead areas. Last year it collected 68,000 bottles of blood from volunteers.

The Ontario Government has announced a \$50,000 grant to the Canadian Red Cross Society to expand its free blood transfusion service. This grant will permit the Red Cross to extend its transfusion service into Metropolitan Toronto on the early part of next year and there will be a gradual extension of the service to all parts of the province.

Under this plan, blood which costs in the region of \$35 a bottle, will be available free to the hospitals for their patients. However,

Guelph Escapee, 17, Captured After 95 MPH Chase by Police

A police chase of a flaming car at speeds up to 95 miles an hour and a foot chase by a posse of nine men led to the capture near Georgetown last Friday of a 17-year-old youth from the Guelph Reformatory.

Constable Mervyn Harness of the Acton detachment of the Provincial Police, started the chase when he spotted a car driving in an erratic manner through Acton, and the chase might have ended in the death of the driver, John Fold, 17, if the car had not crashed into a ditch on a sharp curve between Acton and Georgetown.

"About two miles after the chase started, I saw flames leaping out from under the pursued car," Const. Harness said. "I thought the car would explode any minute."

He said the car forced 12 cars off the road during the chase and caused a car driven by Lawrence Thredgold of London, Ont., to turn over in a ditch when the driver attempted to escape crashing into the fugitive car.

Fold escaped for a second time after his car failed to make a curve and crashed into a ditch, tearing off three guard rails.

He was captured by a posse led by Const. Harness and P.C. Harley Lowe and Cpl. Ted Scott of Georgetown and Cpl. James Bilborough. The search for the man took place during a driving rain, police said.
