

Stewart who is a former recyc of Acton and an ex Warden of Halton County, has disposed of his entire 70 acre farm in Action to the town of Acton and the new industry

In an interview with J. J. Stewart, land owner, he revealed the buyers of his progerty to be H. F. Porter Company (Canada) Limited, Toronto. He further stated finalization of the land purchase had been completed with H. F. Nunn, vice president and general manager of the company

In his statement, Mr. Stewart personally said although he didn't know what branch owned by this corporation was moving to Acton, he fell it was an asset for the town in general.

"It is a wonderful move for the town, and will provide a quest deal of latest and an increase of business for the merchants." Mr. Stewart related. "The town as a whole will benefit by this move, and although we hate to leave the old homestead, the move is a strip towards the progress of Acton," claimed the

Mr. Stowart stated the land was expected to be broken in the near future and thought the railway siding into the property would be started soon

"We have until the 6th of September to give up possession of the fand and until february to vacate our home," said Mr.

Surveyors have been working the past few weeks and test drilling of the soil is completed. At last week's council meeting the necessary provisions and details were approved as presented by Mr. C. F. Leatherland, writing solicitor for the town

In a telephone conversation with Mr. Hunn this morning, he revealed to the press the H. K. Porter Company (Canada) Limited had purchased the land from J. J. Mr. Nunn printed out that final details for the Actor industry had not been ironed out at present, but erection of the plant for Acton would be started in the near future.

Two companies are in operation in Canada, federal Wire and Cable, of Guelph, and Henry Disston Saws, Ltd., Toronto The companies manufacture a wide variety of products such as steel, refractories, rubber, high pressure fittings and electrical switch gear.

Several warehouses are located in Canada from coast to coast, stated Mr. Hunn
