Funeral of C.A.Symon Held at Family Home

Funeral of the late Charles Archibald Symon was held on Monday afternoon from the family home on Willow Street, and was largely attended by friends, relatives and business associates. Charlie Symon passed away on Friday at the Western Hospital in Toronto. He had been in poor health for the past two years.

Charles Symon was born at Guelph but spent his early years in Acton. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Symon. When a young man he went to Toronto and entered business. For a ten year period he resided in Montreal and has been eastern sales manager for the Paul Moore Company. He was recently transferred to Toronto in the same capacity and resided at 2225 Watson, Orchard Drive in Port Credit.

While many of his years were spent away from Acton, Charlie Symon always retained a keen interest in his home town. He visited here often with the family and any Actonian who contacted him in Montreal or Toronto was assured of genuine hospitality from Mr. and Mrs. Symon.

Surviving are his wife, the former Cecilia B. Wilson, and a son, Mr. Mac Marguerite Taylor and brother, Mac Symon, the latter two residing in Acton. Many friends there share with them the loss they have sustained.
