Mr. Kelsey, after hearing the by-law read, suggested it was not in the form of a by-law but appeared to be copied from a deed.

Mr. Kallott informed council his company could not possibly build a quality house for the original agreement at between \$9,000 and \$11,000. The price standard would have to be raised to a minimum of \$11,000, he stated.

The representative claimed his company lost \$1,000 on some homes sold as they were sold that much below cost.

Councillor Love stated he found it hard to believe as in Glasgow, Santa Claus only came once a year, and it was hard to imagine anyone would give away \$1,000.

Mayor Tyler noted that in his opinion as he felt there were very few differences and thought an agreement could be reached.

Council resolved to hold a committee meeting with Robert Hudson Co. representatives to discuss restrictions building.

Councillor Barbeau reported a conversation with a representative from Mirro Plastics stating that the power break last Tuesday had cost the company in the neighborhood of \$1,000.

It was explained to the council that in his absence on holidays arrangements had been made to renew the complete power line on Church St.

A discussion took place regarding the method used in numbering the houses in town recently. Council decided to have a letter sent to J. Munnell, president of the firm, and bring the matter to his attention.

A letter was read from Magistrate K. M. Langdon regarding his recent directive in respect to speeding charges.

Enclosed with the letter was a form presently in use by the provincial police whereas anyone convicted on a speeding charge may fill out the form and if he wishes to plead guilty, have his case heard 15 minutes before regular court session.

Mayor Tyler reported to council the street allowed for the construction of a new bridge on Mill Street at an estimated cost of \$1,000.

Council agreed to have the road committee ask for tenders for the job and to approve the tender accepted.

Villagers Take Third Game 10-7 Lead One Game

Campbellville defeated Milton Wednesday night by a score of 10-7 in an exciting but loosely played ball game. The win gives Campbellville a 3-1 edge in games with the next two games in their own park. The lead changed hands several times and going into the seventh and final inning, Milton was ahead 7-6 but a four run outburst by Campbellville sewed the game up.

Milton opened the scoring in the first inning when Hannant singled over second with one out, went in second on a wild pitch and scored when Dredge erred on Rhannon's grounder. Campbellville came right back with three runs in the second to take a 3-1 lead. Bill Cairns was safe on Hannant's error and went to second on Elliott's single. Elliot stole second and both runners scored on Jack Roberts' single. Roberts then stole second and scored on Moore's single.

In the top of the fourth, Campbellville scored again to build their lead up to 4-1. Bob McPhail walked to open the inning, stole second and scored on Moore's single.

In the bottom of the fourth, Milton came up with a big three run rally to tie the score. With two out, Gervais walked and Hannant singled. Gervais then doubled down the left field line to score Henderson. Once again the lead changed hands when Milton scored two runs in the bottom of the fifth to take a 6-5 lead. With one out, Bert Gyokery walked and men were on first and second when Cairns dropped Mike Gyokery's fly in centre field. Gyokery's single then doubled in a run and Dredge's error let in another.

In the top of the sixth, Campbellville scored one run to tie the score. Roberts walked, advanced to second on a passed ball and scored on Moore's single.

Milton came right back in the bottom of the sixth to score a run and take a 7-6 lead. Melanson singled, stole second, and when McPhail threw to third wild in attempting to get Melanson stealing that base, the Milton third baseman romped in.

That set the stage for Campbellville's big seventh inning. Early on, Bill Cairns was safe on the second baseman's error. Bill Elliott was then hit by the pitcher to load the bases with none out. At this point "Nip" Gervais who had held Campbellville to three hits on Saturday replaced Gyokery on the hill for Milton. Gervais pitched to Cairns and a single down the third base line to score Early and Cairns. The throw went home and as the throw came in again, McPhail advanced to third. Hannant then bobbled the ground. Dredge knocked, permitting McPhail to score.

Milton threatened in the bottom of the seventh but failed to score. Two singles, a pop-up and a stolen base put men on second and third with one out. Milton then put in the left-handed hitting Lever to bat for Rusk and Campbellville countered with Roberts pitching for Henderson. Lever popped to Roberts who ran over and touched third to double the runner off.

Both pitchers were hit hard and given poor support by their mates in a game that saw 16 errors evenly distributed. Mike Gyokery hurled six innings for Milton the was replaced in the seventh with the bases loaded and none out and allowed three runs and 2 hits. He walked two, hit one batter and struck out six. Nip Gervais hurled one inning, giving up one run off two hits. For Campbellville, Stan Henderson allowed seven runs off 11 hits. He walked two and struck out five. Jack Roberts took the only man he pitched to.

Hannant, Mike Gyokery, and Serafini, each got two singles for Milton while Gervais, Gervais, Vaughan, Shannon, Melanson and Bert Gyokery each singled once. Ken Moore led Campbellville's 14 hit attack with four singles and was closely followed by Stan Henderson with three. Bill Cairns doubled and Jack Roberts, Al Wingrove, Bill Elliot and Bob McPhail all singled once. Lloyd Early hit two singles for the winners.

Footnotes: Bill Elliot played the entire game in right field despite a broken finger. The Campbellville team were without the services of Jack Laking, their hard hitting catcher. Laking was away on business. The fourth game of the series will be in Campbellville Saturday afternoon at 2:30.

Next in line we have Mr. Roy Nellis, of Heapey, son of the fourth month old baby that sailed from England. He served his country three years and visited the homes of great aunts and cousins in England. Bert came to Cecil Nellis home from overseas where his father was in partnership with a brother, Smith Nellis, in farming. But it wasn't as happy a homecoming as it might have been. In his father's pocket, away shortly after and some time many a hard working member of the clan have been told. Two minutes after was held in reverence for those at rest and James Nellis followed with prayer.
