Urge Longer Hours To Cut School Tax

SIDNEY, B.C. (CP) - A longer school day and a longer term, with fewer interruptions and shorter holiday periods, are favored by the commissioners of this Vancouver Island village.

In a resolution to be forwarded to the British Columbia municipalities convention, the commissioners recommend a half hour longer school day and a school year running from September 1 to June 30.

It urges that Christmas holidays be limited to 10 days, Easter recess to four days or less, and no more than four statutory holidays in any school year.
