Villagers Take Dunnville 10-4 in Series Opener

Campbellville started their quest of the Intermediate B championship by defeating Dunnville 10-4 before over 500 spectators in Dunnville on Monday afternoon.

Campbellville had scored four runs before a man was out in the first inning and never looked back. Ken Moore opened the game with a triple to left. Two walks loaded the bases and singles by Henderson, Laking and Dredge plated four runs.

Dunnville got one back in the second. Gifford, the catcher, walked and went to third when Hamilton threw poorly to second after a bunt and scored on an infield out.

Campbellville scored two more in the fourth to make score 6-1. Moore was safe on an error, stole second, went to third on a passed ball and scored on another passed ball. Each then blasted a long home run over the right field fence.

The score was 7-1 after the fifth as Campbellville scored another. Bill Cairns walked, went to second on an infield out and scored on Hamilton's double.

In the top of the sixth last year's intermediate A champion scored three more to move the score up to 10-4. Wingrove's walk, Henderson's double and Jack Laking's long inside-the-park home run accounted for the runs.

In the bottom of the sixth Dunnville scored their second run. Two singles and a walk loaded the bases with none out but Hamilton bore down and only one run scored on an infield out.

Dunnville completed the scoring in the bottom of the eighth when they scored twice on two walks and a double.

Harry Hamilton went all the way for the winners. He allowed four runs off four hits, six walks and a hit batter. He struck out nine.


