EDMONTON (CP)—Rev. Gwyn Thomas at 87 has become a world traveler.

Mr. Thomas, with twinkling eyes and a thick thatch of silver hair, has been visiting in Algeria, far from his home at Pen Maen Mawr in Wales.

Except for a few months in France following the First World War, he had never been outside the British Isles until he was 81. Then he decided to fly to Damascus to visit his son, a doctor in charge of a Damascus hospital. He spent 82nd birthday in the Middle East.

Finding that trip had agreed with him, Mr. Thomas left Britain early this spring by boat and arrived in Canada, coming directly to northern Alberta to visit another son, Dr. Alan Lloyd Thomas, at Smoky Lake.

Still active in church work, he has preached at Smoky Lake and took part in a wedding ceremony here shortly after he had a rival.

Plans have been laid for Mr. Thomas to return to his home in Pen Maen Mawr. Already, he is thinking of his next trip. It will be to India where his numerous daughter and son-in-law are stationed. But he said, "I'm wondering what effect the heat would have on me."
