Trafalgar Municipal Hall Again Comes to Light, Plan Studies

TRAFALGAR—The possibility of a new Trafalgar municipal, which was defeated in a plebiscite by eight votes during last December's township elections, reared its head again at a Trafalgar council meeting. Councillors Near and Bulmer were selected to form a committee with the township departmental heads to present the facts of the township's present accommodation and the desire for newer, roomier offices.

The township departments are "desperately" in need of new offices, according to Councillor Larry Cond. "If we present the facts correctly," he said, "the voters will be much more likely to approve the municipal hall."

Mr. Cond said the facts will be published just prior to this December's township elections. He said it is necessary to get public approval of the hall as soon as possible. "Better to be sooner than later," he said.

"Additional space is essential," Reeve Donald Bath told council. He added later that "I think the information has to be published so that the people realize just how things are."

Deputy-reeve Phillips suggested that the facts and figures should be presented in a brief to the ratepayer's associations.

Last December, council estimated a figure in the neighborhood of \$250,000 as the cost of the new hall.
