Commission Discuss Department Duties Hear Complaint on Overtime Hours

All Duby, sewage superintendent, complained to the commission of working 76 hours in recent weeks for a take-home pay of \$71, when the Public Utilities Commission met last Thursday.

Mr. Duby asked the commission if they were going to do anything toward compensating him for the overtime he has been working.

The sewage superintendent told commissioners that as a result of recent water and sewage projects undertaken by the town and the P.U.C., it had been necessary for him to lay the water and sewage pipes during the day and his duties at the sewage disposal plant had been performed Sundays and overtime.

In a discussion on a report from the Ontario Water Resources Commission recommending closer supervision of the sewage disposal plant, painting of outside equipment, a check of the flow of storm water and treatment of effluent with oxygen, the commission recommended that someone be at the disposal plant at least six hours a day.

In replying to questions from the commissioners, Mr. Duby stated the disposal plant was being run in accordance with recommendations made by the representative of the O.W.R.C. when he was working for the Department of Health. The O.W.R.C. is now doing the work of the Department of Health.

The O.W.R.C. official should make his recommendation in writing, stated the superintendent, so we would know where we stand. As the matter stands now, he said, if the representative makes a criticism now, there is no way of proving we are acting under instructions.

J. McGeachie, secretary-treasurer, explained the operator should be at the disposal plant six hours a day making tests at regular intervals. Mr. Duby agreed with this point and asked the commission what they were going to do about his wage scale for the overtime he puts in.

"76 hours is entirely too much to ask a man to do. It is throwing too much responsibility on him," stated chairman J. J. Stewart.

The chairman told the commission that Mr. Duby had been hired as superintendent of the sewage disposal plant and there was too

much money invested to expect him to be doing other jobs too. In referring to his overtime, Mr. Duby said, "If overtime was going to reflect on my annual salary, I don't want any part of it."

Commissioner R. Everdell agreed that Mr. Duby's first responsibility was to the sewage disposal plant and that a person can only do so much work in a day. He thought it was time the commission started breaking in another man to help with the work.

It was the opinion of Commissioner C. Lindsay that council should have a man for their own projects if Mr. Duby is not available.

The commissioners agreed to have a committee meet with council and discuss the problem. It was the opinion of the commission that the water superintendent and sewage superintendent had been hired to do a certain job and the job should be done specifically by the proper department involved in any projects.

Council was to be notified that superintendent Duby was not available for town work.

The commission was notified that the paint had been selected for the hydro building on Alice St. The commission granted approval to H. Wilson, on behalf of the Scottish Country Dance Club, to have the use of lights at the park for their event on Saturday.

It was further granted that the park board be allowed the use of the hydro truck at the park for a stump pulling bee on Saturday, September 14.

Hydro superintendent D. Mason, in his report to the commission, told of some of the mercury vapor lights on Mill St. exploding the globes on account of the heat and

the rims, being made of stainless steel, would not expand and contract with the heat. Two men from the company had been in Acton and brought new bands of a white metal substance and they were found to be satisfactory.

The superintendent reported on the power shut-off scheduled for Monday.
