## Halton Board Favors Co-op Order Will Place Hogs on Open Market

An important order governing the direction of hogs to assembly points of the Ontario Hog Producers Co-operative was announced Tuesday at the annual meeting of the Co-operative in Toronto.

This order under regulation of the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Act and the Agricultural Products Marketing Act will be effective September 16. It directs that all hogs produced in the counties of Huron, Bruce, Grey, Wellington, Dufferin, Peel and Halton are to be transported and assembled at any of the 11 assembly points of the co-operative and the Toronto

stock yards. These yards are at Kitchener, Stratford, London, Chatham, Windsor, Barrie, Lindsay, Leitham, Hamilton, Newburg, Ancaster and Toronto.

Another order announced under the regulations requires shippers of hogs in Ontario to register their names, addresses, and occupation with the Ontario Hog Producers Marketing Board.

James Baynton, secretary of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, told the delegates "How successful this next phase of our open market program is, and how readily the processor and shipper respect the law, is going to depend on how de-

termined we hog producers are to make it work."

C. W. McManis, president of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, said, "The orders have been passed and will be rigidly enforced without fear or favor on all parts of the trade. The orders will regulate both the delivery of hogs by the transporter and the buying of hogs by the packer."

Archie Service, secretary of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, said "Our Board has unanimously supported this move."

Representing Halton at the annual meeting were E. Dawson, president; Roy Couffer, and Mr. Service, secretary.

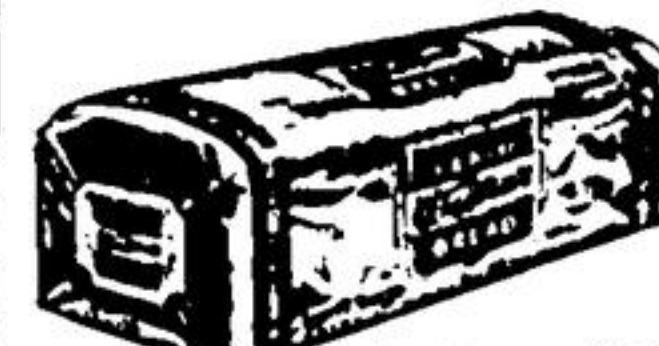
