Residents Protest Industry Odour Give Fire Protection-to-District

Councillor J. Guy suggested the Act. Fire Dept. Branch at Queen's Park be called in and asked to send in a measuring stick in order to determine the size of the smell.

Mr. Brock stated "It is difficult to get the fire department to do this as the communication officer does not want to give them trouble with Beaconsfield."

Councillor F. Weller asked Mr. Brock what the facts were and Mr. Burrel was keeping him in the loop as the Victoria and Waterford areas.

To the question, Mr. Brock responded "I have never been satisfied when we have had inquiries about the way in which and further action taken on the matter. We have now informed the Beaconsfield residents that there is a problem in Acton for a period of time."

Mr. Brock requested "I have an appeal submitted that the matter has been referred to council and they called in a bunch of experts."

Mrs. Tyler asked who in council made the statement and emphasized that he make statements if you don't know."

Mr. G. Thompson informed council she had checked with Dr. Berry on behalf of the residents and he stated his department could do nothing for them. He suggested Dr. E. Bell of the Halton County Health Unit be contacted.

Council resolved to appoint a committee to contact the responsible authority to have air pollution tests taken in the Glendale sub-division when there is definite evidence of Tonawanda pollution and that the committee would make their findings available for public scrutiny.

Council heard a report of a special committee meeting with the fire committee and Esquemeau and Erin townships at which Nassagawaya was not represented, regarding fire protection in the townships.

Council agreed to accept the recommendation of the fire committee to supply fire protection to Erin and Esquemeau townships on a temporary basis at \$150 per call until October 21, when a meeting would be held to thrash out final agreement with the townships and the town of Acton.

A by-law was introduced and given a first and second reading to authorize construction of a water pumping station, installation of necessary pumps and standby unit, metering equipment and the connection of watermain from the well site on Peel St.

Council resolved to procure 13 pictures of the Queen for the N.Z. Bennett school.

Mr. McAdams from the Planning Consultants office, presented the council with copies of the proposed subdivision agreement and reviewed and explained details of the agreement including building permits and conditions, financial arrangements, types of buildings, services, watermain, sewer and hydro installations, curb, sidewalks, paving and payment of taxes and many other conditions.

Mr. McAdams explained to council it was a basis of the town of Acton's agreement with all subdivisions wishing to build.

Councillor H. Lowe suggested the builders should be screened first. Councillor Guy, holding a copy of the agreement in his hand, replied, "This will sift them through."

The planning consultants notified council that the success of the atomic development is only as good as the agreement.

Council resolved to have the agreement submitted studied by a firm of solicitors and have them inform council of the legality of the agreement being acceptable to the Revised Statutes of Ontario.

A request from the P.U.C. for council to submit a list of needed lights around town and their locations was referred to the road committee for a survey of the town after dark to determine the number needed.

A request from Thomas and Thomas building contractors, for 21 building permits was approved on the basis of 20 permits granted for single dwelling units and one permit granted for a lot, conditional on no water supply being granted. Recommendations were submitted from R. V. Anderson and Associates regarding the present sewage disposal plant and suggestion of an industrial sewage disposal plant. Estimated extension of the present plant was valued at \$75,000 while a new one equipped to handle 450,000 gallons of sewage per day was \$300,000.

No consideration was given a proposed site in the report but adjacent to the present plant was suggested. The report was left with a committee undertaking to investigate all particulars.

Council granted \$45 to the fire department to apply waterproof paint to the outside of the new fire hall.

Councillor Guy forwarded a request from the ambulance operators for permission to have a siren installed on the ambulance. Councillor Guy pointed out to council the need for a siren at times in order to avoid delay.

Council resolved to grant permission for the welfare committee to purchase a siren and have it installed on the ambulance.

Council passed a resolution to change Mill St. from Acton Boulevard to Yonge St. in a westerly direction and Arthur St. from Yonge St. to Acton Boulevard in an easterly direction, to one-way streets.
