The town council has agreed to accept the recommendation of the fire committee to supply fire protection to the townships of which Nassagaweya was not represented, regarding fire protection in the townships.

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Oakville Sees An Overdraft On Centennial

OAKVILLE—Although the Oakville Centennial Committee had \$600 in the bank on July 31, outstanding accounts may cause a \$3,000-\$4,000 overdraft when the accounts are turned in.

The July financial statement shows expenditures of \$31,460 and a revenue of \$32,451. Included in the revenue column are grants of \$11,063 from Oakville and \$1,000 from the Township of Trafalgar.

Town officials are hoping for additional Centennial brochure sales to help in raising the money to cover the overdraft. If sale of the brochures falls to materialize, the Town of Oakville will be approached for an additional grant to cover Centennial costs.

Of the town appropriations used to date, \$2,500 came from the 1956 budget, and \$2,533 this year.

Mr. McAdams explained to council it was a basis of the town of Acton's agreement with all subdividers wishing to build in the area.

Councillor H. Lowe suggested the builders should be screened first. Councillor Goy, holding a copy of the agreement in his hand, replied, "This will sift them through."

The planning consultant notified council that the success of the agreement is only as good as the agreement.

Council resolved to have the agreement submitted studied by a firm of solicitors and have them inform council of the legality of the agreement being acceptable to the Revised Statutes of Ontario.
