**Asian 'Flu Strikes In Canadian Cities**

A rash of influenza cases in various parts of Canada has kept doctors busy and youngsters out of school in some places. Medical authorities, however, said the 'flu seems to be a mild type. Only one person, an elderly man in Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., has died and doctors termed it a rare occurrence.

Some cases of Asian 'flu, which has appeared in the United States, have been identified in Canada. Federal Health Minister Monteith said. However, only six of the thousands of cases reported have been identified as of the Asian 'flu type, and these were among girls who attended a world guide camp last month at Dew Lake, near Huntsville. The girls—four from Dutch Guiana and two Canadians—were sent home after treatment at Toronto.

Dr. W. F. Brown, Ontario chief medical officer of health, said vaccine would not be available before October. Supplies would be limited and the vaccine probably would work in only about half of the cases, he said.

In Sudbury and Capreol, a total of 100 cases had been reported up to the start of this week. In Mat-lawa, 60 miles east of North Bay, high schools were shut down for this week.

**2nd Acton Pack Receive Thanks From Hospital**

The Brownies of the 2nd Acton Pack have received a letter from C. A. Sage, acting superintendent of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, thanking them for the scrap books which they made and sent into the hospital. This project was part of the Pack's tribute to Lord Baden-Powell.

The letter states that all the work and care taken in the making of the books is fully appreciated both by the staff and the small patients and that the project was indeed a complete success.
