Accept Tender of Galt Firm On Promise to Use Local Help

BRAMPTON—The Hamill Construction Co. of Galt, Ont., has been awarded the contract for the new Peel County registry offices. 19 tenders were submitted. The Galt firm entered a bid of approximately \$430,000 which was \$100,000 less than the lowest submitted by the Andren Construction Co. of Brampton. However, the angle of employing local labor was the point which made the Andren bid appear more acceptable to some councillors than that submitted by Hamill. County council studied the two contracts for two weeks before reaching a decision. Normally the Galt firm would have been granted the contract immediately in view of its lower bid, but the expected unemployment rise this winter, coupled with the letter to the municipal government from the Brampton Builders' Association about employing local help, led to lengthy consideration of the Andren bid. However, after discussions and conferences with the two companies, council awarded the job to the Galt firm after they had received assurance that local sub-contracting and laboring help would be hired wherever possible. Construction will begin on the new building as soon as Municipal Board approval is received. The new structure will be built behind the present building and will house the registry office and new council chambers.

Oakville Plans Shopping Centre

OAKVILLE—Municipal interest has acquired the 33-acre plot which lies south of the Q.E. and north of Cross Ave., between the Queen Elizabeth Hotel and the Sixth Line North. Under the management of Gibson Bros. Ltd., Toronto realtors, it is proposed to build a 30-unit shopping centre there. Leases are being offered and signed now. Samuel Bronfman of Distillers Corporation - Seagram Ltd. is reported to be the financial principal behind the program. The land was acquired from Duncan Harwood and Co. Ltd., distillers. It comprises all of the land west of the Q.E. Hotel with the exception of about five acres recently purchased by the Singer Sewing Machine Co. for a main office site.

A spokesman for Dominion Stores Ltd., which has been reported as having signed a lease in the new shopping centre, said that he couldn't confirm this now. He added: "We would definitely be interested, providing the other leases are taken up and a full-scale shopping centre develops there. We wouldn't think of going it alone." Dominion Stores Ltd. has a suitable site in the Oakville area. Probable effect of such a nearby shopping centre on downtown trade remains to be seen. Merchants on the main street have felt that the principal threat to them lay in the 100-acre property of the E. Weston Realty Co. at the north-east corner of the Seventh Line and the Q.E. Hotel.
