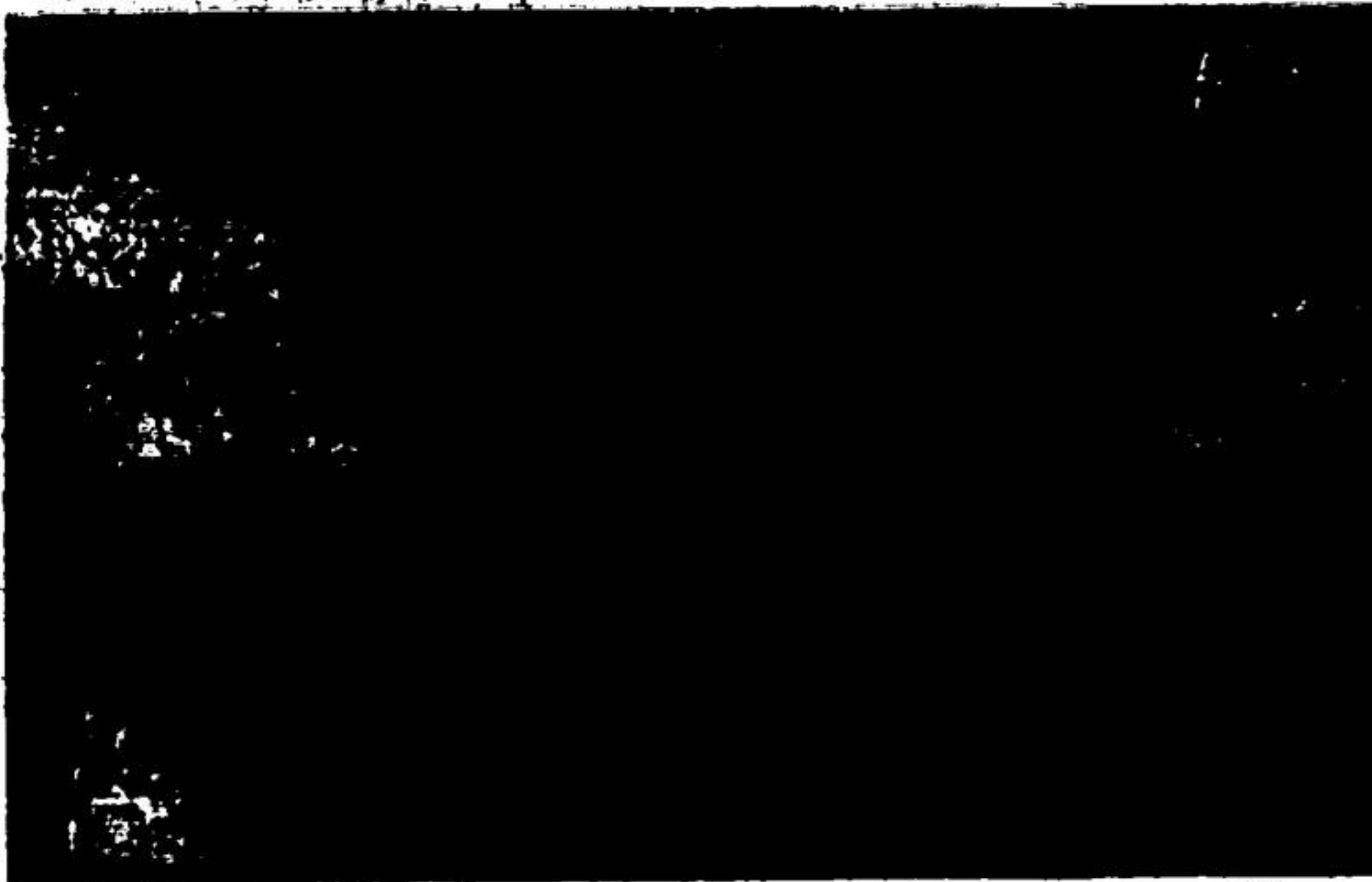
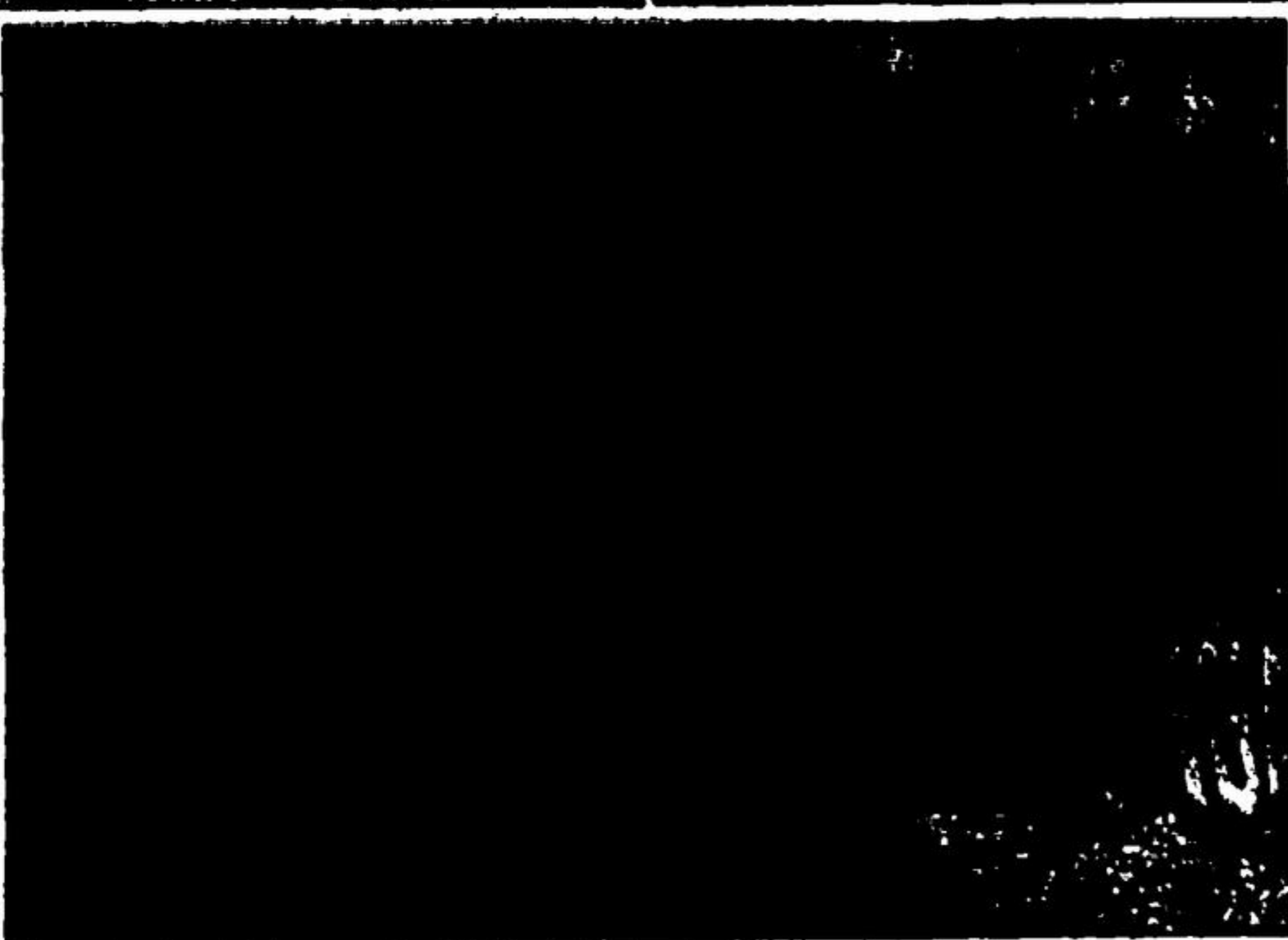


**PARADE'S PRIZE-WINNING DECORATORS**

**Bus for Handicapped To be on View Friday**

Something new in buses will be seen in Acton this week. Two of a fleet of four specially designed and built for handicapped folk, the Callow buses, with some base at Halifax, are making a tour of Ontario centers, to show what the Maritimers have been doing in helping their handicapped persons to see hockey games and other sporting events, or just to take them for a drive in the country. The bus will be on display at 4:15 p.m. at the Town Hall, Acton, Friday, September 27, 1957.

Each bus holds 12 wheel chairs. Each is loaded by a special ramp into the wide rear doors, with each wheel chair securely fastened to the floor for the ride. In addition, there are comfortable seats for 11 other handicapped persons.

Purchased by an organization known as "Callow Veterans' and Invalids' Welfare League", which also pays all expenses of operation, the buses in one year alone took no less than 11,867 handicapped persons on outings of various kinds. At most sporting events in the maritimes, the wheel chair patients are regular attenders, with other service clubs co-operating by making sure seats are available at all events. It might be added that these are usually the best in the house.

Cost of the four buses was approximately \$50,000, plus cost of operation, with money being raised by private subscription. Curiously enough, the founder, Walter Callow, cannot ride the buses. He's been bound to a hospital bed for the past 20 years. A victim of an airplane crash while with the R.C.A.F. in the first world war, in the past years he has never left the hospital.

Despite physical handicap and complete blindness, he's very actively engaged in the operation of the buses and keeps in constant touch with the organization through his special telephone. Currently his attention is focused on expanding his organization so that the special buses will soon be operating in every Canadian province bringing joy to home-bound crippled folk all across Canada. So far, Alberta is the only other province to join the movement, one bus being stationed at Calgary and another at Edmonton.

The current tour through Ontario, to show what can be done in practical helping of handicapped people, is being sponsored by the March of Dimes. While this is not exactly our field, since we are primarily a rehabilitation foundation, we feel that recreation and entertainment of handicapped people is closely related to our own ideals and we strongly recommend to the service clubs that they investigate the possibility of representing the Walter Callow organization in Ontario. Mr. W. Denis Whitaker of Hamilton, president of the Ontario March of Dimes stated:

"Every penny of our own funds are being used to pay medical costs of physical correction and other aspects of rehabilitation, but we feel strongly that the other aspects of the problems of handicapped people—recreation and entertainment—should be looked after as well. The tour will visit the main centres throughout Southern Ontario during September and October."

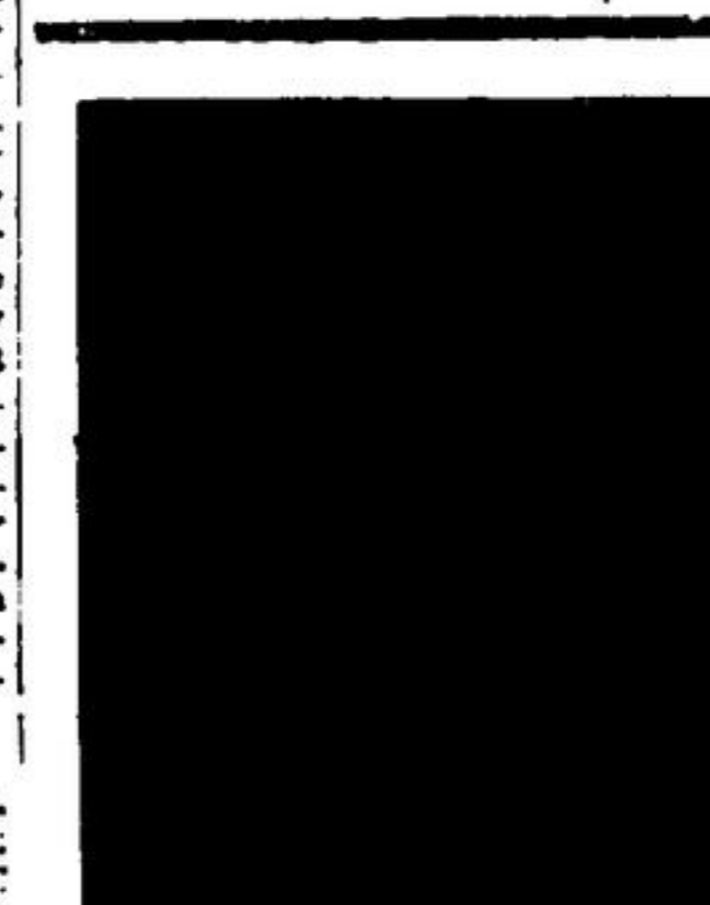
