

# Campbellville Drops First Int. "B" Bid As Wilkesport Wins 4-3 on Sunday

Campbellville failed in their bid for their first Intermediate "B" championship when they dropped the final series to the defending champions from Wilkesport in two straight games last week-end.

The story of the series as far as Campbellville was concerned was too much Bobby Conlon, as the Wilkesport southpaw shut them out on Saturday and hurled two air-tight relief innings on Sunday.

The Saturday game in Campbellville was won 8-0 by Wilkesport as Conlon hurled four-hit ball. He walked three, hit one batter and struck out 17. Harry Hamilton was on the mound for Campbellville and although he was touched for 11 hits while walking two and striking out two, he pitched well enough to win most games as five of the eight runs scored off him were unearned as a result of loose defensive play by his team mates.

Wilkesport used the long ball to take a 3-0 lead in the first inning. With one out, Horley sliced a double to his wrong field and was driven home by Keith Arnold's home run into right field. First baseman Mullens then homered in to left field. There was no more scoring until the fifth when Wilkesport picked up their fourth run.

Keith Arnold opened the inning with a single and went to second on Bill Arnold's single. Conlon then grounded out, third to first, with the runners advancing, but Keith Arnold overran third and Earl Cairns' perfect throw to Dredge had him trapped, but Dredge dropped the ball and Arnold scored.

Wilkesport completed the scoring when they scored four runs in the seventh. With two out, Bill Arnold and Conlon singled, and when Dredge fumbled Grant's roller, the bases were loaded. Right fielder Brown then stepped in and smashed a grand-slam home run over the road in right field.

Campbellville's only big scoring opportunity came in the sixth when, with one out, Henderson singled, Laking walked and Earl Cairns was hit by the pitcher, to load the bases. Right handed hitting Jack Roberts then came in to hit for Elliot but Conlon tightened down and struck out Roberts and Dredge, to end the threat.

The powerful Keith Arnold led the Wilkesport attack with a home run and two singles. Bill Arnold hit three singles while Brown and Mullens homered. Grant and Conlon singled. Jack Laking picked up two of Campbellville's four hits while Stan Henderson and Lloyd Early had one each.

Sunday's game in Wilkesport was a much closer contest and the home team squeaked by with a 4-3 victory and their second O.T.A. Intermediate B championship.

Campbellville outhit the winners 8-6 but except for the third inning when the Halton champions scored all their runs Wilkesport tightened up when in trouble and left nine Campbellville runners stranded.

Neither starting pitcher lasted the route. Bill Arnold, the winning pitcher, started for Wilkesport and went seven innings, giving up eight hits while walking three and striking out four. Bobby Conlon, Saturday's winner, hurled the last two frames, allowing just one hit and striking out four of the six batters he faced. Stan Henderson started for Campbellville and went five and two-third innings, allowing four runs off six hits and six walks. He struck out four. Jack Roberts then did a masterful relief job for two and one-third innings as he held his opponents hitless while walking one and striking out two.

Grant opened the bottom of the first with a single for Wilkesport. He stole second and scored on Horley's double. On an attempted pick-off at second, Dredge let the ball get away from him and Wingrove, recovering, threw wildly to third, allowing Horley to score. Wilkesport's second run.

The 2-0 score held up until the top of the third when Campbellville scored their runs. With one out, Wingrove singled off the right field fence and went to second as Early walked. Henderson then singled sharply into left center, scoring Wingrove. The throw went from the left fielder to the catcher, back to third, trying to get Early coming into that base, but it got away from the third baseman, with Early scoring and Henderson going to third. Henderson then scored when Earl Cairns bounced a double over the right field fence. The score remained 2-2 until the bottom of the fifth when Horley opened the inning for Wilkesport with a walk, stole second, went to third on an infield out and scored on Mullens' double to left center. Billy Arnold's single then drove Mullens home with the winning run of the ball game.

Footnotes: The Wilkesport team had three brother combinations in the Arnolds, Conlons and Grants.

After the first inning of Sunday's game, the Campbellville infield of

Earl Cairns, Al Wingrove, Elmer Dredge and Ken Moore performed in brilliant fashion, playing probably their best defensive game of the season.

Wilkesport used only nine men in the two games while 13 players saw action for Campbellville.

Sunday's game was the first loss suffered by Stan Henderson this year. He had nine victories to his credit.

Southpaw Bobby Conlon, who hurled 11 innings in the series, shut Campbellville out on five hits while striking out 27 batters. The same Conlon faced Campbellville two years ago when pitching for Carleton and was driven out of the box as Campbellville scored 10 runs in the first four innings.

Jack Laking's 378 season's batting average led the Campbellville regulars. Jack Roberts finished up the season with 99 strike-outs to his credit.

In Sunday's game Horley and Mullens doubled for Wilkesport while G. Grant, Bill Arnold, B. Grant and Brown singled. Stan Henderson led Campbellville's nine hit attack with a double and a single. Earl Cairns doubled and Ken Moore, Al Wingrove, Lloyd Early, Jack Laking, Bill Cairns and Jack Roberts all singled.

As negotiations between union and company hit a snag the parties have asked for a conciliation officer, and although the application from the union has gone for consideration, negotiations are still continuing, states Hoy G. Stuart of Malton, secretary.
