Fifty thousand copies of Scriptures in the Zulu language are being published by the British and Foreign Bible Society, which has begun an experiment in distribution in South Africa with the financial support of the Dutch Reformed church.

This denomination is making money available to the British and Foreign Bible Society for the free distribution of St. Luke's Gospel and the Book of Acts bound in one book. In three of the most popular Bantu vernaculars, The Bible Society will do the distribution through the churches in order to assure that it is done in the most responsible way possible, and that a sound follow-up is carried out. Zulu is the language in which the experiment will begin. This year with the Dutch Reformed Church meeting the cost of publication.

Take Apart, Study Radio Forum List Hints for Better Meetings

National Farm Radio Forum was taken apart and carefully studied by 18 farm leaders from Quebec and Ontario who attended a five-day workshop at Bristol, Quebec, last week. Those attending represented the Ontario and Quebec Farm Councils, the Quebec Farmers Association, the Concentrated Milk Producers, Quebec Women's Institute and several district farm organizations.

The workshop also brought to light the fact that many groups are not using good discussion techniques simply because they have never had the opportunity to learn how to use them. Some groups tired of dealing with the "same old topic" over and over. On examination, it was found that the real problem in such case is usually one person dominating the discussions which makes all topics sound the same.

The workshop participants came up with a 10-point program of action for District Farm Forum Committees and a list of suggestions for better district meetings as the main suggestions for improving the effectiveness of National Farm Radio Forum. According to those at the workshop there is a great need for well balanced meetings which start and end on time. Such district meetings are necessary each month to deal with the Farm Forum findings and relate them to farm organization. The other hand, many Formosa require help at times with group operation.

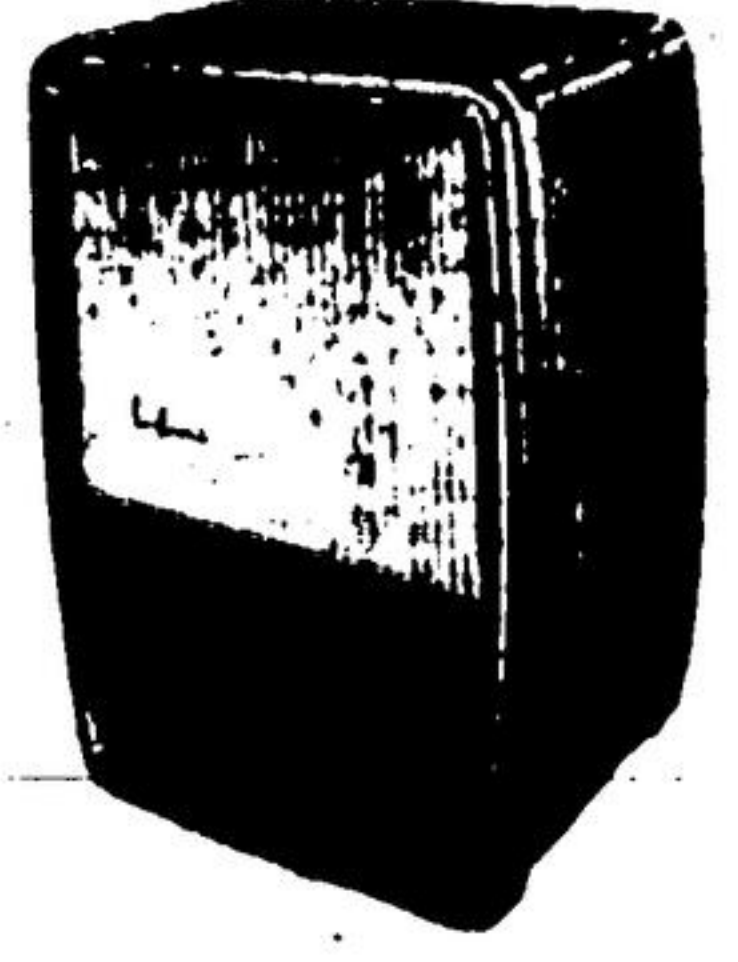
-Daylight Saving Time will continue in Acton until the end of this month.

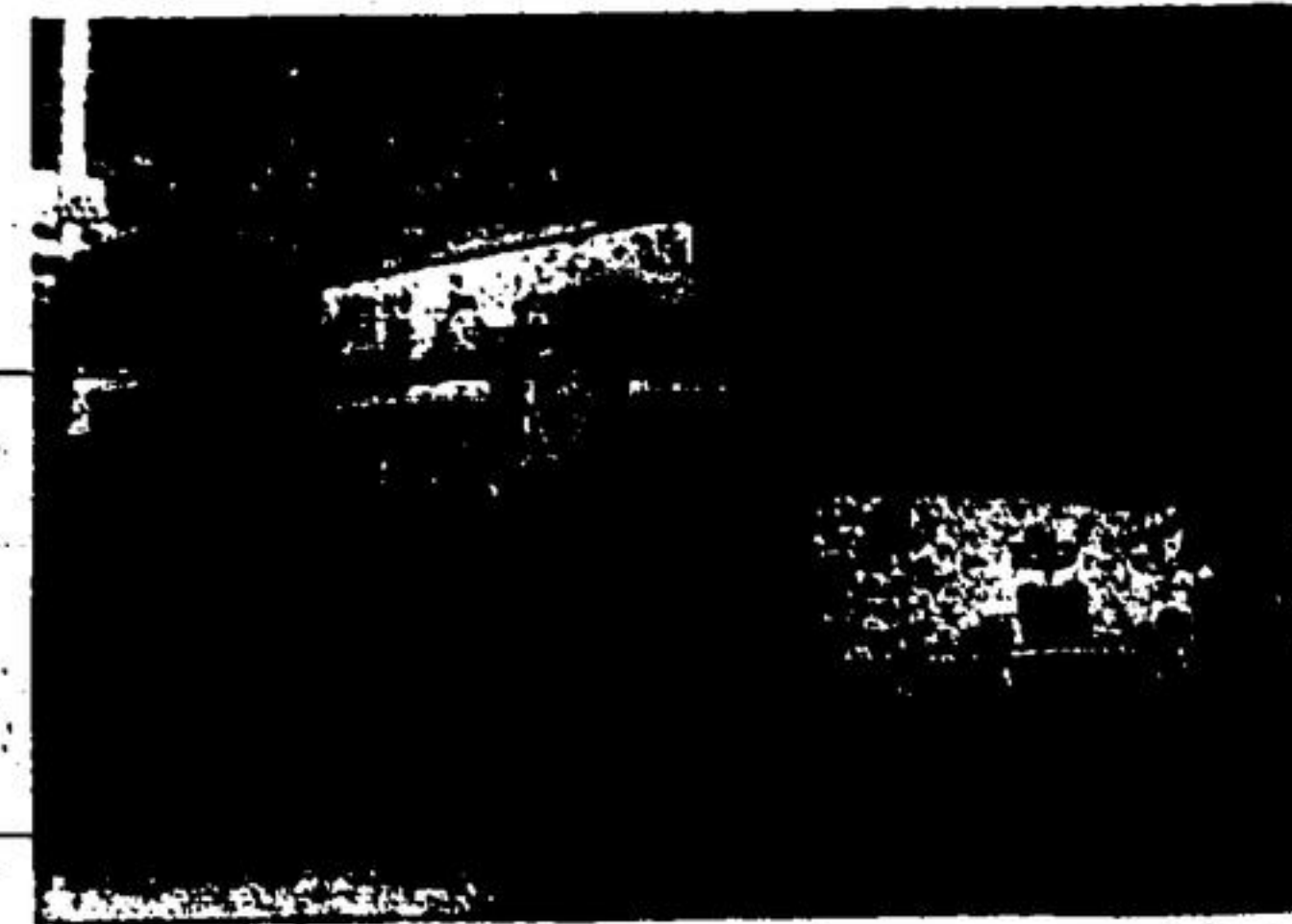
