

Board Calls Public Discussions On Eramosa School Problems

A printed appeal went out to the public last week from the Eramosa Township School Board to the ratepayers of the Eramosa Township school area concerning what is termed "two major problems of school accommodation."

Presented briefly are improvements required to bring all schools up to desirable modern standards and to make provision for additional classrooms to provide for an expected annual increase in enrollment.

Meetings have been planned, one in each school on the following dates at 8:30 p.m.: school No. 1, October 8; school No. 2, October 10; school No. 3, October 11; school No. 4, October 17; school No. 4a, October 22; school No. 5, October 24; school No. 6, October 28; school No. 7, November 3; school No. 8, November 7; school (town hall), November 12; school No. 10, November 14; and school No. 11, November 18.

At these meetings, it is hoped to answer questions regarding school problems. Members of the school board have enlisted the expert advice of architects and contractors and have visited other schools where the same problems exist.

Two proposals have been submitted for study, listing in detail the possible costs of each. The first deals with the modernization of old schools and providing accommodation up to 1960 that is only just over two years distant.

The second, which the Eramosa school board prefers, favors centralization of schools and the

Radar, Helicopters Shelf Small Craft

PORT LA TOUR, N.S. (CP) — Before the dawn of radar and helicopter rescues, shipwrecked sailors depended a great deal on small rescue craft operated out of tiny coastal villages for their safety.

One of these small craft, long since retired from active duty, is about 50 years old. Its shape and size is similar to a whaling craft. For many years the hardy, car-driven craft operating at one of the more treacherous points on the Nova Scotia coastline—Negro Point—was a welcome sight—in many rescues.

As scientists perfected new means of projection, it became evident that the village lifeboat was on its way out.

Edward C. Crowell, not wanting to see the valiant little boat forgotten altogether, bought it from the department of transport and had it transported to his home where it stands as a tribute to a bygone era.
