Will You Be There?

Interested in Acton's future? A major decision faces Actor Council when they meet in special session Saturday morning

Council has given its assurance that services would be provided for the new owners of the Wool Combing plant known to be a high water consumer and consequently having a large quantity of sewage effluent. The assurance is conditional on approval of the Ontario Water Resources Commission and the Ontario Municipal Buerd

Prior to giving this approval council received figures that indicated the project's capital costs would be met through the sale of the services to the industry

The sewage and water committee of council has considered the expansions and recommended that the water project be procerded with and the sewage treatment plant be dropped. One committee member however noted they did not consider the revenue in making the report

The decision to provide the services, or drop them as well as the new industry, is the problem facing council

The price tag on the new industrial treatment plant is \$300,-000 and this plant would offer some relief to Heardmore & Co. in their disposal problem. These industries would be paying for the service and liquidating the debt on the plant. The debentures would be against the town of Acton

The new industry would reportedly employ 150 by next April. Looking shead too, it has been suggested the existing treatment facilities would have to be expanded anyway and this might be delayed by the present construction of the industrial treatment
