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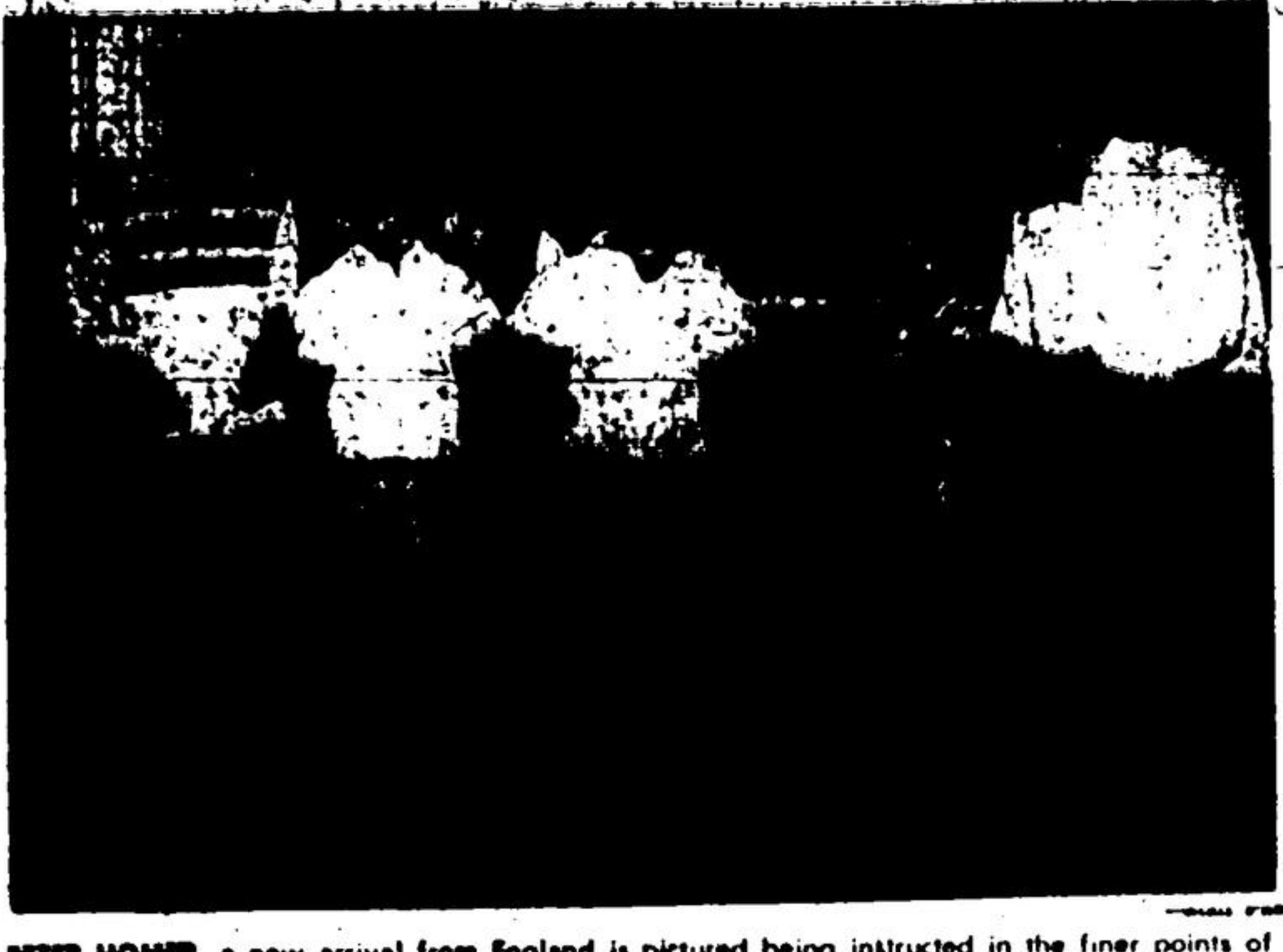

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Tanning Research Program Explained by Ex-President

Montreal, Oct. 16th.—Lester Blouin, president of Edgar Cleaners Ltd., Quebec City, and outgoing president of the Tanners Association of Canada, speaking at the extensive research program set up in the tanning field, said that while this is a long range venture, it has already made possible many practical achievements.

Mr. Blouin explained that with shoe manufacturers and other leather users bringing inventories down to a normal level, a real slackening in tanners' bookings had resulted. Consequently, previous years' high level curtailed production to a reduced demand effected a brief weakness in prices.

The export of raw hides and finished leather has slowed down to the freezing areas, due to currency slumps. However, since mid-summer, several large shipments have moved abroad.

With tanners' bookings and deliveries on a definite upward trend at present, it is evident excess inventories have been reduced. Judging by present conditions, a better and steadier demand can be expected in the months ahead.

Educating an interested consumer public through proper channels, says Mr. Blouin, has motivated preference for, and a growing appreciation of leather. The Canadian tanning industry has this year produced new textures, a variety of new colors, and a new fashion creativeness to match the inspiration of the countries.
