

### Panel Discussion At Public School

Mr. Wright pointed out there should be a line drawn between social discipline and punitive discipline.

The panel agreed unanimously that punishment should be administered immediately the misdeed occurs. Magistrate Mitchell added he felt it should also be thorough.

Again, consistency was stressed as being very important and any punishment should be on the level of the child's comprehension.

There was some division of opinion as to whether the strap was the best way of enforcing discipline at home and at school.

Magistrate Mitchell agreed that it should be used. He felt there is often too much interference in school affairs by the parents. Parents shift responsibility onto the schools and won't give teachers authority to exercise proper control.

Mr. Wright felt he couldn't say yes or no to using a strap and thought it depended on the individual child. The normal child would not resent punishment. The child must learn to conform in society if he is to adjust successfully as he grows up and if reasoning fails, other means must be found.

Dr. Buckner felt the strap is a necessary evil. He warned it should only be used as a last resort because if it brings no results, the parent loses control of the child completely.

The panel felt generally obedience should be enforced through a reasoning process and not through fear. However, a very young child does not reason and still has to be coerced in some manner.

Magistrate Mitchell asked how much discipline there really was without fear? Adults live according to law and often the motivating force is the fear of being caught. If they don't fear a basic emotion and affects many of our actions.

Mr. Wright was of the opinion an adult was not qualified to discipline unless he could do so dispassionately. Any obedience through fear without understanding was unhealthy.

Dr. Buckner felt fear was a negative emotion and these positive emotions that govern our actions much more than fear.

The panel again concurred that a whole group should not be punished for the misdeed of one or two children. It was pointed out, however, that it is sometimes impossible to pinpoint the culprit and yet some control must be exercised, so the group suffers.

The panel members remarked the children of today are not much different than they were 50 years ago. Children often copy attitudes observed at home. It is up to parents to set a good example. If parents discipline themselves, it will be easier for the child to learn to conform to the different rules and regulations he encounters as he grows up.

where the income dollar goes  
In supplying hundreds of different oil products to Canadian consumers from coast to coast, Imperial last year took in a large number of dollars. What happened to a typical dollar?  
Well, nearly 56 cents went to buy raw materials—notably crude oil—and for freight, a big item in a big country.  
More than 26 cents went for operating and administrative costs, including wages and salaries, and for depreciation. Ten cents of each dollar went to various governments in taxes (this does not include the provincial gasoline tax.)
