

### Trafalgar Population Jumps From 14,000 to Nearly 18,000

TRAFALGAR — Population has jumped from 14,000 to nearly 18,000 in Trafalgar township since a year ago, assessment commissioner E. M. Durham revealed. Total assessment as of September 30 was \$42,285,262 compared with \$40,051,352 a year earlier.

In releasing the figures on which 1958 township taxes will be based, he stated land value had risen from \$11,381,002 to \$12,772,555 over the year. The value of buildings jumped from \$24,718,040 to \$30,881,358 while business assessment rose from \$4,014,250 to \$4,701,376.

The population figure for September 30 was 17,875. This does not include the number of township dogs, who recoded a sharp increase themselves. Dogs in Trafalgar numbered 908 compared with 875 a year earlier.

### Ask Two-Year Term In Brampton Council

BRAMPTON—The installation of a two-year term for members of Brampton's town council will come before the voting public for approval or disapproval at the municipal elections December 8th. The by-law to set up the December vote was passed through council.

### Milton Guernsey Cow Receives High Award

Another cow making her debut on the list of Guernsey cows in Canada that have produced over 100,000 lbs. of milk is the "Good Plus" cow Rennwood Vicky, owned by Wm. G. Booth, Craig Meadow Farms, Milton, Ontario, and bred by Rennwood Farms, Cobourg. In ten lactations averaging 10647 lbs. of milk and 558 lbs. butterfat seven of which were made in 305 days. "Vicky" produced 106,470 lbs. milk containing 5582 lbs. butterfat and for this production has been awarded a Diamond and Seal Certificate by the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association, the highest award available for Longtime Production.

### Stock Company Gets Approval

GEORGETOWN — Unanimous approval was given by those attending the regular monthly meeting of the North Halton Builders Association to a proposal to incorporate a new public stock for the purpose of constructing commercial and industrial buildings in Georgetown.

The meeting was attended by over 80 builders sub-contractors and suppliers. Members pledged themselves to invest a percentage of their future earnings in stock of the company which would be capitalized for at least \$1000. It was also agreed that the general public would have an opportunity at a later date to subscribe for stock in the company if they so desired.

### Face Court Action So Township Changes Subdivision Policy

TRAFALGAR — Faced with the threat of a \$100,000 court action, Trafalgar council went into a huddle last week to reconsider a recently adopted subdivision policy.

On September 16, council established a policy that all standards and requirements in effect at the time of the signing of subdivision agreements would form the basis of the agreement.

Halton Park developers, delayed two years in reaching an agreement with Trafalgar for a subdivision plan on the corner of Rebecca St and the Third Line, objected to meeting the terms of a new agreement. They charged that an agreement should be based on township requirements established when they first attempted to negotiate a subdivision agreement.

If placed in a position where they would suffer further losses, the developers declared they would seek compensation from the township. They said these losses would exceed \$100,000.

A meeting to discuss a policy change in light of the threatened court action has been called.
