

Rev. R. Jackson Guest Minister At Knox Anniversary Services

Knox Presbyterian Church marked its 111th anniversary Sunday with special services both morning and evening. Large congregations filled the church for both services.

Rev. Robert A. Jackson, M.A., minister at Knox's Church, Galt, for the past three years, conducted the morning service and preached again in the evening. He came to Canada from Ireland in 1949.

The main theme of Rev. Jackson's message, both morning and evening was fraternalism. He suggested the anniversary of the founding of the Presbyterian church in Acton was the ideal time for the members to reaffirm their faith — in God and in the church.

He told the congregation Jesus offered personal salvation to all those who sought it.

Special music in the morning included a solo by Norman Elliott, The Lord's Prayer, and an anthem by the choir, Break Forth Into Joy.

Charles Kirkness, chairman of the resources committee, explained the Scotch Project, which the church is currently participating in. He explained the purpose behind the every-member visitation to be conducted in the near future.

Mr. Kirkness related to the need for expiating all the resources of the congregation for the good of the church as a whole.

Rev. Jackson had a special message for the children before they retired to junior congregation.

In the evening, Rev. A. H. McKenzie conducted the service. Members of other local churches joined in this anniversary service. The scripture was read by Rev. G. Adams of the United Church and prayer was offered by Rev. R. McKenzie of the Baptist church.

Mrs. John Davidson rendered two solos, Bless This House and I'll Walk with God. Norman Elliott sang How Great Thou Art and the choir offered an anthem, Praise O Ye Servants.
