

Bishop Bagnall Administers Confirmation at St. Alban's Church

The Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara, the Rt. Rev. W. E. Bagnall, D.D., administered Confirmation and preached the sermon at St. Alban's church last Sunday. The pastor, Rev. Evan H. Jones, presented 31 candidates to the Bishop for the Laying on of Hands. After the service at a reception held in the Parish Hall, his Lordship presented confirmation certificates and autographed prayer books for the confirmands. Lunch was served by members of St. Alban's Guild. Bishop Bagnall congratulated the pastor and his candidates, and expressed pleasure at being present in St. Alban's again for the purpose of administering the ancient rite of the church. He said that he hoped the confirmands would remember the text he had chosen and always associate it with the occasion of their confirmation. Texts were wonderful things, his Lordship observed. The words were tucked away in our minds and hearts, suddenly arising as a source of comfort in times of need. From one of the Epistles of St. Paul, addressed to a tiny group of Christians, many of them slaves, Bishop Bagnall chose the text: "The measure of the stature, of the fullness of Christ." 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President Previews Importance Annual Remembrance Day

In an interview with Legion President Vic Patrick this week, he directed a message to New Canadians from the Canadian Legion, and pointed out Canada has lost over 100,000 men in wars. The president explained, "On November 11, the anniversary of the armistice which ended World War I, Canadians from coast-to-coast will pay tribute to these dead." Commenting further, he noted, "Out of respect to their memory, wreaths will be laid at war memorials and two minutes of silence will be observed." Mr. Patrick explained the two minutes' silence is a custom which began in 1918. The late King George V asked that all normal work and all other activity cease for a period of two minutes, starting at 11 o'clock. He said New Canadians will note that many Canadians wear a poppy on Remembrance Day. The Canadians first came to associate the poppies with the war dead during the bloody 1914-1918 campaigns in Flanders. Each spring, explained Legion president, poppies sprang up over the graves of the dead, like a silent word of remembrance. Canadian soldier-physician, Lt.-Col. John McCrea pleaded with the living to remember the dead and what they had done. He himself died in France, but his plea, and the poppies he wrote about in his celebrated poem, "In Flanders Fields", lived on. In 1926, the poppy was adopted as the symbol of remembrance. These poppies are manufactured by disabled veterans. Funds raised by their distribution go to help other needy veterans and their dependants. So to-day the poppy serves two very important purposes: it is a symbol of remembrance
