Mr. Brock, querying Mr. Cook's report, asked in the event the industries involved were not here in 20 years, who was going to pay for the disposal plant Mr. Cook proposed.

Mr. Cook explained it was quite possible other industries would be available to use the disposal plant. Mr. Brock asked how many normal industries, such as the one to be located on the former Stewart property, would be able to utilize this plant, and was answered, possibly two or three.

Joe Hafka, not questioning but expressing a desire for industry in order to create more work for the people of Acton, stated not only will the workers in Acton benefit by new industry but the people employed will spend their money here and therefore the merchants and business people gain.

H. D. Rachlin asked whose idea it was and who brought the matter before council in the first place. Mayor Tyler explained he had been approached by officials from Canada Packers asking if the town was interested in obtaining another industry. MLA Tells Halton CCF About Future of Organized Labour

In speaking on the future of organized labor, Reg. Oisborn, M.L.A. for Westwark East, told the regular meeting of the Halton CCF Association held in Milton last week, that on the labor front the trade union movement must seek to organize the unorganized.

He said it is cheaper and easier for workers to gain a favor than what they produce through political action leading to legislative action rather than by strike action. He said three provincial labor federations, Ontario, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, had endorsed the CCF as their political arm and predicted more would follow with a similar action being taken by the Canadian Labor Congress.

George Fenton, who is running for the Oakville council in the municipal elections, addressed the meeting briefly to explain why he had decided to run for council. Jack Henry, federal candidate, chaired the meeting and handled the discussion following Mr. Oisborn's talk. Reports of committees were adopted and everyone was urged to attend the 25th anniversary celebration of the CCF in Hamilton, December 4, at the Delta Colonnade.
