Say "Germ Warfare" Reduced B.C. Tribe

Recent discovery of the writings of Rev. W. G. Ellison revealed an explanation of the "curse of the Spaniards" well talked of by Indians near this fishing village.

Rev. Mr. Ellison, a pioneer resident of Port Renfrew, 60 miles north-west of Victoria, compiled a history of the community shortly before his death in 1888. The writings have been discovered by his daughter.

The Pacheena Indians of Vancouver Island, together with associate bands, could muster 6,000 fully-armed warriors from Washington state to the Queen Charlotte Islands. But a type of germ warfare used by a handful of Spaniards in the 18th century reduced the population of a village of 500 to only 20 members.

In 1780, Captain Jose Maria Narvaez sailed the Santa Gertrudis into San Juan Bay here in the search for a missing trader, which had been captured and sunk by the Pacheenas who had been forced to dig for gold.

One of the two Spanish women captured by the Indians paddled a canoe out to the Santa Gertrudis in darkness and told of how the crew of the trader had been slain
