Transportation of patients was supplied on various occasions to Hamilton and Toronto. Anyone who would like to offer transportation to these centres should contact himself or Mr. Alcott, Mr. McWilliams said.

A report on service work was read from Mrs. G. F. Thompson, stating the principle of this active branch of the unit. Duties of the committee are to prepare and distribute dressings for cancer patients, take gifts to them and in general make patients as comfortable as possible, supply transportation to clinics for treatment, and whenever needed, to care for patients and families at home.

The next general meeting is planned for Acton on December 12.

Industrial Arts and Home Economics teachers as well as Music Supervisors met separately.

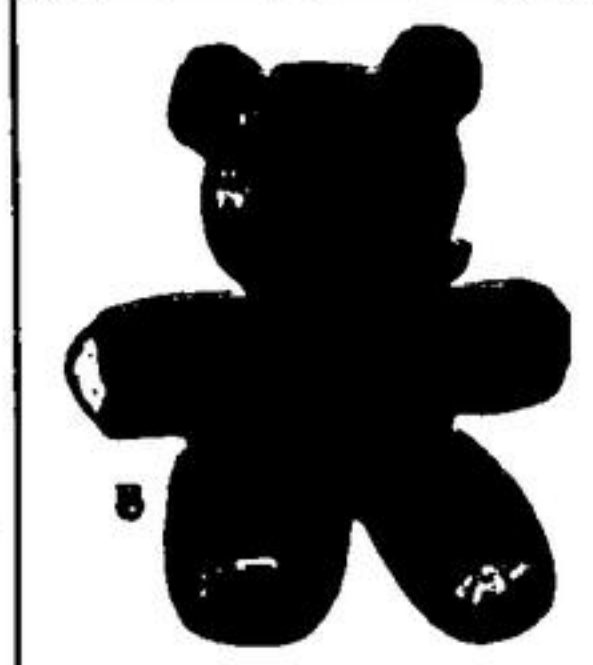
Teachers plan to meet again on Monday, February 3rd.

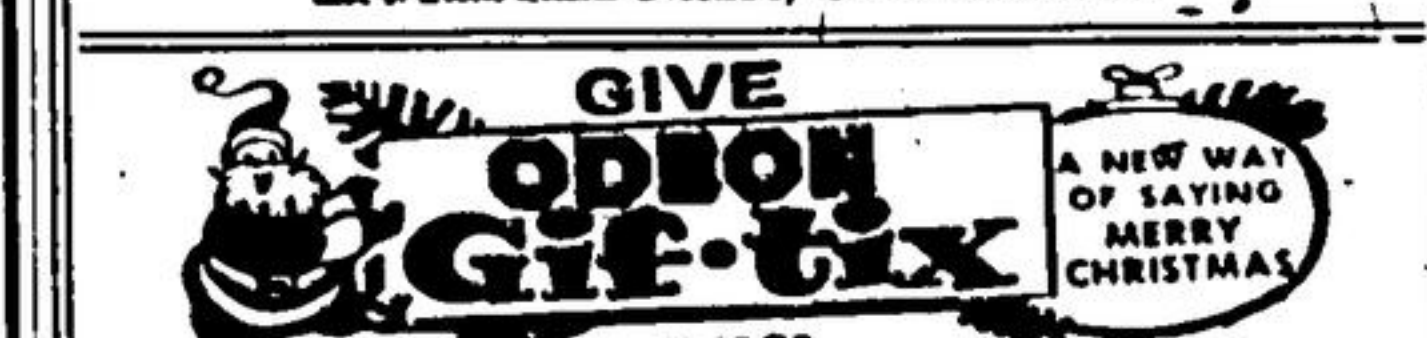
