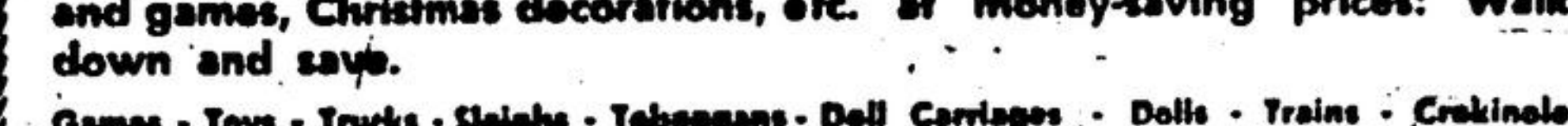

20 At Annual Meeting Return G. G. Addison Group President

Halton M.P. Delivers First Speech On Commons Centennial Debate

"Sandy" Best delivered his first speech in the House of Commons on Monday, December 9, following his election as M.P. for Halton. The local member was speaking on the resolution introduced by Stanley Knowles that the government give consideration to the establishment of a 100th anniversary committee for planning the economic and social development of the country to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Canada in 1967.

Mr. Best noted the Conservative party "could not support the idea of a committee which would take over in a rather vast and amorphous form functions of the house, the special committees, and of the cabinet."

"This great ambitious resolution has tremendous sentimental appeal, but is put in such a manner that we could not possibly agree with it."

During his 3,000 word speech, Mr. Best drew the ire of Mr. Knowles, Mr. Winch, Mr. Pickersgill, Mr. Byrne, Mr. Carter, Mr. Dupuis. Mr. Best, in his speech, paid tribute to the courage of his predecessor Sybil Bennett and praised the leadership of Mr. Diefenbaker, "we have seen the unveiling of a program of wise and constructive policies long since due."

He directed attention to the Centennial resolution "in a more specific way" by noting the riding of Halton is in many respects a cross section of eastern Canada.

"The effects of the St. Lawrence sawway, of the automobile and aircraft industries, of agriculture, of construction, the vast problems of roads and services and above all of education, are brought together and felt more keenly, perhaps, in my riding than in most others."

The speaker reviewed recent legislation, announced the federal budget, and concluded his speech by saying "the construction of new
