Liberals Name Ken Dick Candidate As 300 at Nomination Convention

Ken Dick, Milton solicitor, was chosen Liberal candidate for the forthcoming federal election at a nominating convention Saturday evening, which political observers described as "enthousiastic".

Despite blustery weather more than 300 attended the event in Milton Town Hall to see four candidates nominated for the position Morris Manderson, Georgetown, Wessel Gall, Burlington and Lester Whiting, Oakville all withdrew and Ken Dick was acclaimed the candidate and received a standing ovation when he indicated his intention to stand.

Named convention chairman, E. Harrup welcomed the delegates commenting they looked enthusiastic despite what happened in the last election. "As usual with a Tory government things are not as good as they were," he concluded.

Age in Commons

Mr. Whiting in replying to his nomination noted he had one thing in common with Canada's next prime minister, his age. Declining to stand he expressed his regret for the campaign waged in the last election against Ken Dick. He noted a campaign picture in the last election showed Sandy Best talking to a farmer, his hired man. "If I accepted the nomination I would want to fight on what we say," he charged.

He noted Pearson was held throughout the world as a symbol of integrity. The candidate that goes forth from him must work and have the support of the organization. We must work in this campaign to be sure our fellow men have jobs," he concluded.

Wessel Gall, declined the nomination suggesting his practice of law was just getting started but he urged the delegates in the next six weeks to pledge to get five other votes and have each of them pledge five more votes.

New to County

Morris Manderson reviewed he was relatively new to the county, practicing law in Georgetown. He pointed to the new leader, Pearson, whose personality stands out far above anyone in the Conservative

Supreme Court Quashes \$300 Building Permits

Mr. Justice Wells of the Ontario Supreme Court yesterday quashed an Acton municipal by-law requiring house-builders to pay a \$300 fee for each residence. He said in his judgment, sections of the by-law are illegal.

The Robert-Hudson Construction Co. Ltd. of Hamilton, asked him to quash the by-law on grounds it is discriminatory and beyond the scope of the municipality's powers. The company also claimed in its application that building permit fees set by the legislation are prohibitive.

In an affidavit, Thomas E. Kellott, general manager of the firm, said the construction company bought 193 lots in Acton and built houses which sold from \$11,500 to \$14,000 on 60 of the lots. He said the company purchased 32 building permits for each residence.

Conservatives Name "Sandy" Best As 500 at Nomination Convention

Charles Alexander "Sandy" Best, the main Halton voter sent to Ottawa last June with a large majority over his closest opponent, was given the nod once again to be the Progressive Conservative standard bearer for the March 31 federal election when 500 jammed into the Milton town hall for the Edna nomination meeting. Mr. Best's nomination was unopposed by those in attendance and they cheered and whistled as his acclamation to the position was announced.

In his acceptance speech, the present Halton member urged voters to make this campaign one which will be clinched by victory and the sureness that we in Halton and all across Canada will have a government that will bring progress, development and peace in the world.

Start Immediately

He announced he would start his campaign immediately and began with his acceptance speech in which he took pot shots at the Liberals to left and right. Calling the Liberal government at the time of his loss of Parliament an overwhelming majority, careless of the rights of the people, he continued that "after 22 years of motion, they gradually came to a stop."

"We need less of this negative, can't-do feeling" in government, Mr. Best went on. He explained the Conservative government, put into slim power in the June election, had made a long list of achievements and good beginnings on more achievements were set. Among them, he listed old age pensions, veterans benefits, blind benefits, home building loans increased by \$200,000,000, income tax reductions, the reduction of estate taxes, and financial assistance to the provinces.

"And what have the Liberals been doing in the past seven months?" Mr. Best asked, and replied to the question himself by explaining the Grits outvoted 75% of the government. Conservatives "then they either voted to us or they silently stole away."

Another Chance

Hughes Cleaver spoke briefly reiterating pledges the party had made during the campaign on March 31 to decide what kind of life we're going to have in Canada. He challenged that "We have a lot of work ahead to be sure we don't have four years of unemployment. Unselfish enough to want more of the good times we had."

Peace Party

Pointing to the Liberal campaign suggestion that the Liberals were the "peace party", the speaker told his listeners to beware of this tick. "Any inference," he said, "that th-

In proposing Mr. Best's nomination, E. J. "Tim" Timmerman of Burlington reviewed the work the candidate had done in his seven busy months at Parliament, including work on the Avro and Ford plant situations, the postal facilities in Burlington, and the elimination of level crossings across the country. Quoting one of the older members of parliament, Mr. Timmerman said Mr. Best "has a great capacity for learning. He has learned more in seven months than most do in a term. I predict a great future for this young fellow from Halton."

George Cleave of Esquinton, who seconded the nomination, said he didn't blame Mr. Pearson for his statements about sneaking in Parliament's back door. "That's the only way he'll ever get in," he asserted with a smile.

New Best to Ottawa

Conservative M.P. John Pallett of Peel county suggested Halton's voters should send Mr. Best to Ottawa "with the biggest majority in Canada." He praised the candidate for his contribution to the party and said Sandy has brought with him the greatest depth in the problems of understanding agriculture I have ever seen." He said Mr. Best had pursued all problems concerning Halton with great zeal.

Although speakers kept the large audience clapping and laughing throughout the entire two-hour program, probably the funniest highlight of the evening came when secretary John Dewey of Oakville rose to read the minutes of the last nomination meeting. He wasn't standing very close to an innocent-looking microphone at the front of the stage and a few party supporters off to one side had trouble hearing "Mike, Mike".

The embarrassment came when the hard-of-hearing portion of the audience began shouting "Mike, Mike". This nickname attached to Liberal party leader Lester B. Pearson hardly seemed fitting for a Tory convention, so the lawyer stepped up to the mike and spoke into it. However, no sound blared at the waiting audience.

It wasn't until the secretary had finished his report that county president Les Clark of Georgetown announced the microphone wasn't for a loudspeaker system, but was attached to a tape recorder in the back room being operated by Cy Young of CHWO radio station in Oakville.
