Expressing township council approval of the recommendation of the Board of Transport that a flashing light and bell signal be placed at the C.N.R. crossing near the Stewarttown school when they met in Stewarttown hall on Monday, February 17.

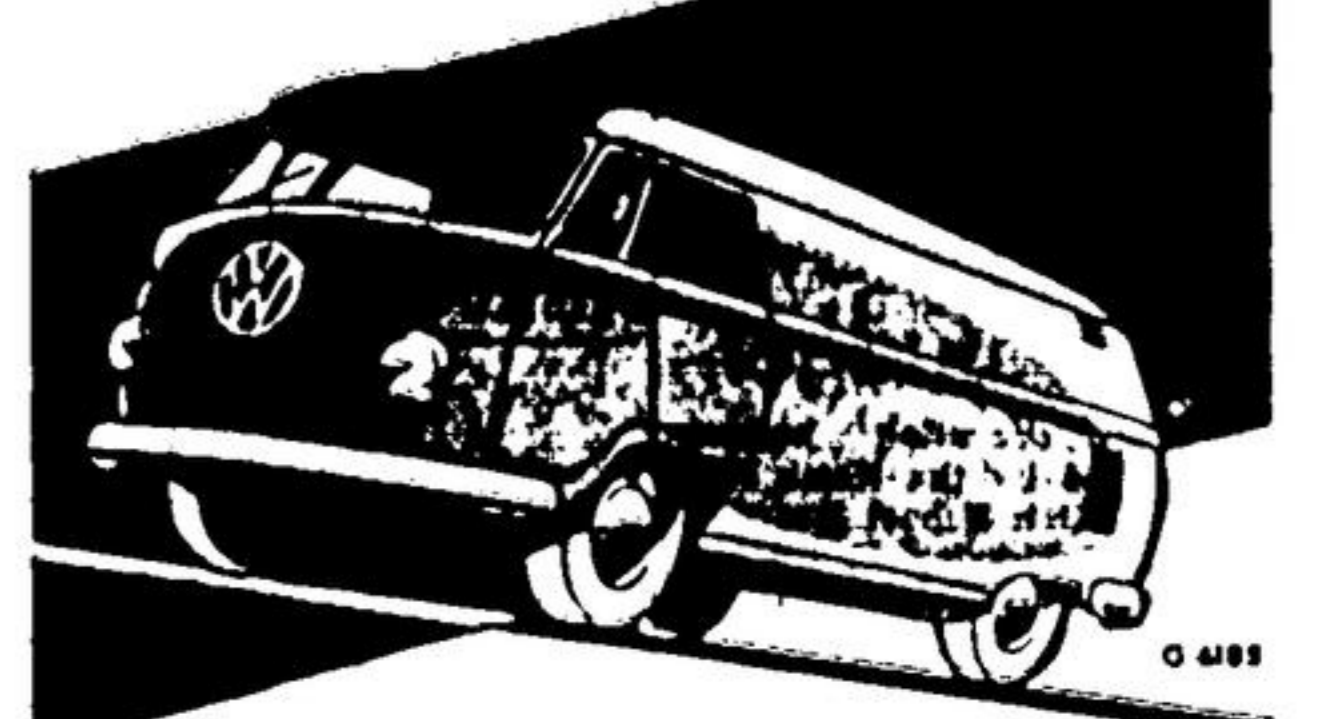
Recommendation from the Missionary and Maintenance Committee that gifts to the fund be 35 per cent of the total church giving was accepted.
